

Many Faculty Members To Attend Summer School

Several faculty members of Medford senior high school plan to do advanced study during the summer months.

Ryder Berg, instructor in geometry and chemistry, has been appointed by Gov. Douglas McKay to take a special course in radiological monitoring at Reed college. The special study was planned as a part of the government's atomic defense program. The course begins June 19 and continues for five weeks.

Mrs. Berg, who teaches physical education in the high school, will study at Southern Oregon college this summer.

Arthur Scott, who teaches biology and mathematics, is leaving this week-end for Minneapolis where he will enroll at the University of Minnesota. Mr. Scott will work on his master's thesis.

Also planning to attend the University of Minnesota is Miss Lorraine Veidt, instructor of vocal music. Miss Veidt's parents live in Minnesota, and she will spend much time with them.

Miss Hazel Hatley, instructor of home economics, will attend the summer session at the University of Iowa, Ames, to do advanced study, and also enrolled at the same school will be Miss Helen Coulter, instructor in the commercial department of the high school.

Paul Gasparotti, who teaches art, has left for the University of New Mexico, where he will take a summer school course in his specialty.

Four teachers plan to attend the University of Oregon. Miss Yvonne Keith, instructor in girls' physical education, Lee Ragsdale, athletic coach, and Devere Taylor, speech instructor and debate coach, will all attend the university's eight-week summer session. Mr. Taylor is working for a master's degree in social science and speech.

Robert Stedman, speech and drama instructor, will be in Eugene to act as technical director for the 1939 production of the pageant, "Oregon Trail," and to study at the university. This will make the third pageant which Mr. Stedman has helped to stage.

The Eugene pageant is considered one of the most outstanding of such events given on the coast. This year's production is set for the last week in July. Mr. Stedman will leave the first of the week, his family remaining in Medford.

Scott Brill and George Barnum, both instructors in the vocational department, will take special courses at the Oregon Institute of Technology at Klamath Falls.

Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Butler, 610½ King street, will leave June 10 for Pullman, Wash., where they will enroll in the eight-week summer session at Washington State college.

Mrs. Butler is dean of girls at Medford senior high school. Mr. Butler instructs in the department of science and in visual aids at Southern Oregon college.

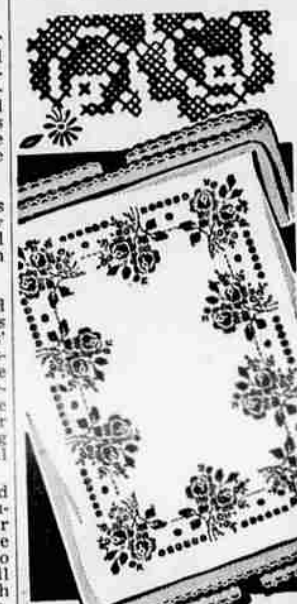
Robert Bennett, who has been instructor in physics at the high school, is leaving about June 15 for Florida where he will engage in private business.
