Roll call was answered with "Why I joined the Garden club." The speaker, who is chairman of the National Horticulture society, spoke on the growing of primroses, citing the difference in growing the flowers 30 years ago and now. She mentioned the several types, some of which originally came from England and Asia, emphasizing that many species of decades ago are again becoming popular, some being preferred over the new strains. When growing for judging contests, one must avoid the "pin eye" and try for longer stems, she said. Pink and clear lavender seem now to be favored over the blue and rust shades. She added, Pests to watch for are strawberry weevil and red spider mite.

In addition to other information, the speaker stressed the importance of rich soils, with plenty of moisture and partial shade. She said seed should be planted in August and September.

A camellia plant was presented by the speaker by the club. The retiring president, Mrs. E. W. Jermak, presented retiring officers with potted African violets and then installed the new officers. Ladino Clover Fields Should Be Dried Up
Ladino clover fields that have not been wilted by withholding irrigation since clipping or harvesting the hay crop should be dried up to force the seed stalks—two or three days of distinct wilted foliage should do the trick. This should be followed by light frequent irrigation.

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tions until the seed head is well filled and the seed is starting to mature.

Lygus bugs have increased in most alfalfa, ladino clover and lotus fields to the danger point. Many growers have assumed that dusting is not necessary until the bloom stage is reached. A pre-bloom dust has resulted in increased seed yield. An application of 20 pounds of 10 per cent DDT dust formulated in sulphur is recommended for lygus and weevil control. The application should be made in the early morning during non-rainy periods.

Increased seed yields have been secured in every seed producing area where ample numbers of honey bees have been placed in the seed producing fields. Utah alfalfa seed production dropped from three million pounds of seed prior to 1930 to only 165,000 pounds in 1932 when an embargo was placed on

importation of honey bees. This increased to 3 1/2 million pounds in 1934 when the embargo was removed.

Dr. H. A. Scullen, apiculturist of Oregon State college, found that 100 ladino clover seed heads yielded only 365 seeds when caged to prevent bee pollination. One hundred heads in the adjacent area exposed to bees yielded 13,948 seeds. One to four or more colonies of bees per acre is desirable for maximum seed yield.
