Oregon Lions Auxiliary Adopts Project for Blind

Oregon Lady Lions, meeting in Medford for the annual state convention, heard reports on the activities of the state organization and of the various local auxiliaries at a business session yesterday morning in the Craterian theater. Slated for this morning were election and installation of new state officers and the closing meeting was a joint luncheon with the men at the junior high school.

More than 200 were attending the women's sessions. Monday morning the state auxiliary voted an annual donation of \$500 for the work of the state school for the blind at Salem. This sum was raised during the past year as the group's main project, and Mrs. Rugen Kuratli, Hillsboro, state president, spoke concerning the auxiliary's interest in the program for the blind. She introduced Mrs. Walter Dry, wife of the superintendent of the school for the blind at Salem, and Miss Mollie Vlasnik, counselor at the school, who spoke.

The committee on credentials reported 36 out of the state's 40 auxiliaries were represented at the meeting, and it was brought out that there are now 1400 auxiliary members in the state. Presidents of nine new clubs in Sutherlin, Talent, Rogue River, Milwaukie, Redmond, Prospect, Medford, Eugene and Corvallis were introduced.

Mrs. Al Selby, president of the new Prospect auxiliary and Mrs. William Bacon, president of Crater auxiliary, Medford, were presented charters for their clubs. A new club has been organized at Santiam and was invited to apply for a charter.

A formal resolution of thanks to the hostess clubs was passed, and a memorial service was conducted by Mrs. Rex Wilson and Mrs. Earl Sims of the Grants Pass auxiliary.

Mrs. Ron H. Gandee, president of the Medford auxiliary, welcomed the delegates and the response was by Mrs. Dean Erwin, Enterprise, first vice-president. Monday's activities began with a "pioneer" breakfast in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel. Mrs. Lee Melish, convention chairman, opened the program and Medford auxiliary members sang a song of welcome.

Mrs. Al Crose, Salem, second vice-president, introduced Mrs. Kuratli and other state officers as well as Mrs. Herbert Hargreaves, Fresno, Cal., wife of an international director and Mrs. Gordon Smith, wife of the international organizer. Also introduced were Mrs. Norval Martin, Mrs. Northrop Hamilton and Mrs. Harry Scott, all past state presidents, and Mrs. Floyd South, Mrs. Frank White, Mrs. Forrest Losee and Mrs. Erwin, all wives of district governors.

Monday's activities closed with the annual banquet and ball honoring district governors and their wives. This formal event was at the junior high school, with music by Evans orchestra.

When he died in San Diego, Cal., in 1945, he left \$111,700 to the children of the Lawton school. Interest now being paid on the legacy has been diverted to a special candy and gum fund in accordance with Hedlund's instructions.
