

Oregon State Fined \$2,500 By PCC in Rule Violation

Victoria, B. C., June 14.—(U.P.) Pacific Coast conference schools were ordered to shell out \$2,500 in fines today for violations of the conference athletic code.

The penalties were imposed by PCC directors as they prepared to wind up their annual summer meeting today without reaching an agreement on televising of football games.

Huskies, UCLA Levied
Oregon State college, which last year got off with the smallest fine, advanced all the way to first place with a penalty of \$2,500. Tied for second place in the annual directors' standings were the University of Washington and UCLA, each with a fine of \$1,800.

Other penalties were: Stanford \$1,150; Southern California \$1,600; Idaho \$1,500; California \$750; Montana \$400 and Oregon and Washington State colleges \$200 each. Last year the 10 member schools were fined a total of \$21,905.

For the first time in history the conference listed the reasons why the various schools were fined.

OSCC's infractions of the PCC "purity code" were listed as "entertainment and transportation of a junior college athlete from Los Angeles to Corvallis and return . . . and failure to abate an alumna in accordance with the direction of the commissioner."

The rulings were \$1,500 for the first charge and \$1,000 on the second.

In other action yesterday conference representatives voted to allow member schools to give full grants-in-aid to student athletes who demonstrate need and pass scholarship requirements.

In the past, it has been necessary for athletes to pay at least \$65 for their annual tuition fee.

Rogues Fielding, Hitting

Medford's Rogues continued to lead the Far West league in the fielding department but dropped to sixth place in hitting, according to official statistics compiled by William J. Weiss and included games of June 4.

The local club is fielding at a 951 percentage or .004 above second place Klamath Falls and .006 above third place Redding. The local club has ranked first or second in fielding right from the 1950 opening.

Medford is ranked sixth in hitting with a .271 average in comparison with Reno's fifth place .272 and Willows' fourth place .280. Klamath Falls leads the league with .318 and Redding ranks second with .286.

Johnny Popovich paced the Rogues in individual batting as of June 4 with a .345 average, with Jack Cooney second with his .343 batting average.

Only four of the Rogues' regulars are batting .300 or better as of June 4, although Don Williams was just a shade under that mark with .299.

Al Bolen dropped out of the dubious honor society of striking the most in the league to be replaced by Terrazas of Eugene with 46. Bolen has struck out 43 times and Bill Adams of the Rogues was next in the whole league with 41.

Jack Lloyd with six wins and two defeats and Carl Heuners who had three victories and two losses paced the Rogues in pitching as of the June 4 games. La Verre Harman with five wins and five losses and Lloyd Jones with four were next in line for Medford.

Sierra of Klamath Falls had compiled seven victories and but one defeat as of that date to lead the league, followed by Hatridge of Redding with six wins and one loss.

Maxie Baer, Ken Overlin Nearly 'Box'

Houston, Tex., June 14.—(U.P.) Former world heavyweight champion Max Baer and ex-midweight king Ken Overlin almost swapped punches in the lobby of the Olympiad arena last night.

Overlin needed Baer while they were being presented to 5,700 fans in ring ceremonies preceding a main event fight between Ralph Helms of Salt Lake City and Julio Serna of Nuevo Laredo, Mexico.

As Baer and former light heavyweight champion Slim Lapsy Maxie Rosenbloom prepared to leave the ring, Overlin remarked that he thought he could knock Baer's "head off."

"Why don't you try it?" Baer retorted.

A few minutes later Baer and Overlin spotted each other in the lobby, but officers separated them before a punch could be thrown.

The lobby incident caused more commotion than Serna's surprise technical knockout victory over the popular Helms in the sixth round of their scheduled 10-rounder.
