Old Fort Placed On Retired List In Rhode Island

Newport, R. I.—(UP)—Fort Adams, an "old soldier" which has guarded the principal entrance to Narragansett bay for nearly 300 years, went on the "retired list" May 31.

With fixed artillery for coastal defense now obsolete, the department of defense has ordered the post abandoned for military purposes. The fort had its earliest antecedents before 1676 when William Brenton, owner of the point where Fort Adams is located, mounted two cannon on the shore to defend his home from Indians and from others approaching from the sea.

During the Revolution, the Brenton Point fortifications were manned by Americans in 1776, next by the British when they occupied Newport, and later by the French in 1780.

In anticipation of a war with France which never came, congress ordered the construction of new fortifications there. It was named after President John Adams.

Strongest in Country
At one time it was the strongest fort in the United States. It mounted 458 guns, 20 mortars and 38 carronades. Though staffed with small garrisons in peace-time, the fort has been in continued military use since its founding.

Except for a few brief hours in 1776, when the guns on Brenton Point drove off a British frigate attempting to run the channel, the fort never has seen combat.

In World War II the fort was a nerve center for a web of aircraft warning systems and headquarters for anti-aircraft defenses for a wide section of the Atlantic coast.

The grounds will be maintained henceforth by watchmen and caretakers under a warrant officer.

Bare Skin Taboo At Miami Beach But It Gets By

Miami Beach, Fla.—(UP)—This oceanside resort's police force has surrendered without a whistle-blast to women who wander downtown clad in only a little more than nothing.

On fashionable Lincoln road, akin to New York's famed Fifth avenue, you can see more skin in 30 minutes than at a full performance of the Folies Bergere. It's strictly against the law, too.

Several years ago, the city council passed an ordinance intended to preserve modesty by requiring the women to wear "sufficient" clothing on the streets. Mayor Harold Turk recently revived the law with an order to all policemen to enforce it.

It didn't take. The law is one of the most abused in the city. Nobody seems to want to press it.

Few Arrests Made
"It's been so long since we arrested a woman for violating it, I can't remember exactly when it was," Police Sgt. Albert Hakam said.

A 10-minute count along Lincoln road revealed 18 women cheerfully paying no attention to the law.

A patrolman whose beat covers several blocks of the swank shopping district didn't look the other way when violators passed. Neither did he write out summonses. He just looked.
