

Television of PCC Games Okayed With Reservations

Victoria, B. C., June 15—(U.P.) Owners of television sets will be able to view Pacific Coast conference football games next season—if the telecasters abide by two stipulations.

Television of PCC games got an official green light—with reservations—as the conference athletic directors concluded their four-day summer meeting here yesterday.

Attendance Guarantee
The stipulations are that each game must be televised in the participating team's home area if there are stations available and a minimum attendance for each game must be guaranteed. The attendance figure is to be reached by mutual agreement between the competing schools.

A change in the Rose Bowl set-up is contemplated, it was learned. The PCC will try to change the terms of the agreement with the Big 10 to provide that it send its best team to the bowl each year. At present, teams are prohibited from competing more than once every three years.

Game Dates Changed
The PCC and the Big 10 will get together about the terms of the Rose Bowl contract at Madison, Wis., meeting scheduled for June 20.

A rule barring freshmen transferring from junior college to PCC schools from participating in spring football practice the same year was adopted by the conference members.

The directors postponed compilation of the 1954 football schedule until the winter meeting at Riverside, Cal., changed the 1953 Oregon State-Idaho game from October 31 to October 24 and approved cancellation of the October 24, 1953 Oregon State-Montana game.

Pendleton, Ore., June 15—(U.P.)—Amateur Ron Clark, University of Oregon student from The Dalles, won the fourth annual \$1,500 Pendleton open golf tournament yesterday with a three-under-par 277 for the 72 holes.

It was the second time in history that an amateur had won the event.

Buying Power of Average Worker Expected to Double

Washington, June 15—(U.P.)—The committee for economic development said today that the average worker's buying power may double in the next 30 years if his production rate continues to rise.

In a report on "How to Raise Real Wages," the non-profit organization of businessmen noted that the average worker now receives \$1.33 cents an hour. In terms of 1949 prices, it said, the worker in 1900 received about 43 cents an hour.

It said the future looked good provided "we have many important scientific discoveries, good management in industry and wise public policies."

The study was conducted by a subcommittee headed by William A. Patterson, president of United Air Lines.

Its report said that success in raising the worker's buying power is "a matter of increasing output per manhour" and of "keeping people steadily at work."

CONTRACT RATIFIED
Portland, Ore., June 15—(U.P.)—The 40,000 northwest members of the CIO International Woodworkers of America have ratified the new contract recently signed by the IWA and all major lumber operators, except the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

Ashland Budget Near Completion

Ashland, June 15—John B. Austin, Ashland city recorder and budget director, has reported virtual completion of the city budget for the coming year. It will be presented to the city council at an informal session, probably Monday, he said.

The new budget is within the six per cent constitutional limitation on increased expenditures, Austin reported, and provides for a tax levy of some \$69,000, as compared to \$67,000 last year. Millage under the proposed budget would amount to about 16.2, as compared to 15.8 last year.

When the budget was first considered several months ago, it was thought that it would be necessary to exceed the limitation by a vote of the people, but further study and revision
