Classroom To Tour Midwestern States

Stillwater, Okla.—(U.P.)—Twenty Oklahoma community leaders will go to school this summer in an Oklahoma A. & M. college "classroom," covering 2,700 miles in seven southeastern states.

The class will work from a chartered bus which will take students to their survey of 18 outstanding community projects in Arkansas, Tennessee, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi.

The four-week bus tour will be part of an eight-week community development course under direction of Dr. C. B. Loomis, head of A. & M.'s community development studies.

Loomis said the bus tour through other states will give students first-hand knowledge of rural developments, TVA units, negro education facilities, rural and city school systems, adult education schools, intercultural youth centers and health projects.

Ex-Portland Police Chief Taken by Death

Portland, Ore., June 15—(U.P.)—Leon V. Jenkins, 71, former Portland police chief, died late yesterday at Physicians' and Surgeons' hospital.

Jenkins suffered a stroke early Tuesday and was unconscious until his death. He was survived by his wife, a son, a brother and a granddaughter.

The veteran officer served as Portland chief from 1919 until 1934 and again in 1946 during the fatal illness of Chief Harry Niles.
