Your Health and Its Care

No one knows what the future

We know today that they are tem-

porarily effective in certain types

of cancer, but are used not to

supplant surgery but to follow

up surgery.

Cancer of the breast should be

removed by surgical operation--

the more thorough the better.

The earlier the better. There is

no good reason why only a por-

tion of the breast should be re-

moved when cancer exists. Re-

moval of only a portion of the

breast is good treatment for

many conditions in which can-

cer may be suspected but not

found.

The use of X-ray or radium

plus the use of hormones as an

alternative to surgery has been

investigated. In my opinion, the

results to date have been such

as to make me more firmly con-

vinced than ever that cancer of

the breast should be operated

on first. Radiation and hormones

may be of great use afterward.

It is not even good practice to

do two operations in the removal

of breast cancer--one to estab-

lish the diagnosis and the other

to remove the cancer. By that I

mean the practice of removing a

small lump from the breast with

the idea of doing a surgical re-

moval of the breast later--if the

lump proves to be cancerous.

Modern day technique pro-

vides for quick diagnosis of a

lump from the breast--within a

few minutes after its removal.

The operation is delayed for the

few minutes required to establish

the diagnosis. If the lump is

benign--non-cancerous--the op-

eration is completed at that point.

If the lump proves to be malig-

nant--cancerous--the entire

breast should then be removed.

This operation is admittedly

mutilating to some extent. It is

common for the arm to become

somewhat swollen afterward.

and limited in usefulness, and

often skin grafts may be neces-

sary to cover the region of the

incision. There is no point in

trying to evade or cover up these

possibilities. Unless cancer is

completely removed, it will re-

cur or spread to other localities

--with fatal results. What does

slight mutilation or temporary

restriction of the use of an arm

mean--as compared to life?

After surgery, radiation may

be useful to dispose of an occa-

sional cancer cell which might

have been left behind. The use

of hormones has proved benefi-

cial in certain situations--after

surgery has been done. Hor-

mones have the effect of slowing

the development of cancer. Their

value as cure still remains to be

proven.

The reluctance of a woman to

undergo surgical removal of the

breast is understandable. Who

wants to undergo surgical re-

moval of anything? The fear of

mutilation often leads women to

implore doctors to use radiation

and hormones instead of surgery.

I have recently had the oppor-

tunity to watch the results in one

such case. That is why I say that

I am more convinced than ever

that cancer of the breast should

be removed surgically. After-

ward, there would seem to be

no good reason why radiation or

hormones may not be useful in

some instances.

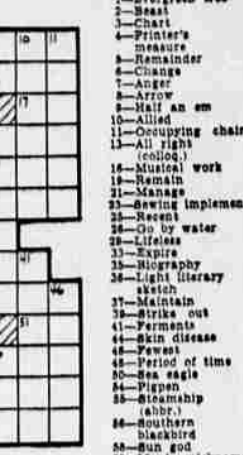

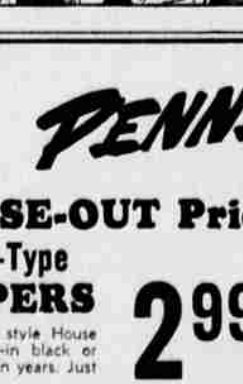
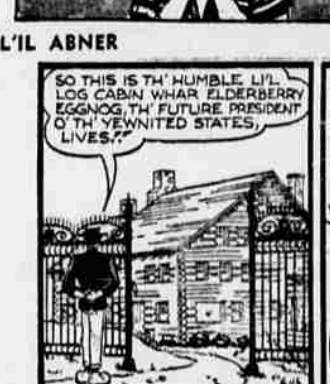
