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1st Baptist Church Marks Anniversary At Special Rites

A full day of services and ceremonies last Sunday marked the 68th anniversary of the First Baptist church in Medford.

Some 300 members and friends of the church attended and three messages were brought by the Rev. Kenneth Tobias, Salem, field representative for the Conservative Baptist association of Oregon.

A picnic lunch was served in the church recreation hall following morning services and Homer Blum acted as master of ceremonies for the program. He introduced long-time members of the congregation, who told of early days of the local church.

History Told
Mrs. Harley Swingle, whose parents were charter members here when the church was founded in 1885, told of some of the church's history, and other speakers included Scott Darby and Mrs. W. H. Eaton, whose husband, the late Dr. Eaton, was pastor just prior to the Rev. Wolford Dawes, present pastor.

Mrs. Swingle, who has been a member of the church longer than any other in the congregation, lighted candles on the anniversary cake, which was baked and iced as a replica of the church building by Mrs. Mearl Kaufman. Mr. Dawes cut the cake.

Gift for Pastor
In honor of his 15 years of service to the church, the Rev. Mr. Dawes and Mrs. Dawes were presented with a portable typewriter as a gift of the congregation. Mrs. James Cook made the presentation, and gifts were also presented to Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Franklin. Franklin was chairman of the building committee which recently supervised construction of the new church annex.

The annex, housing additional Sunday school, nursery, junior church and social activity facilities, was dedicated at the afternoon service.

Mr. Tobias' messages, given during the day's three services, were "The Tabernacle of God," "The Temple God Possesses," and "The House God Is Building." A dedicatory prayer was offered by Mr. Dawes.

Mrs. S. A. Moore was general chairman in charge of arrangements for the anniversary event, and special numbers by the choir and by other musical groups and soloists were featured during the day.

68 Persons Killed in Japan Rain Storm
Tokyo, Japan, June 16—(U.P.) Six days of torrential rain brought death to 68 persons, injured 214 others and caused \$8,800,000 worth of flood and landslide damage, national police said today.

The floods damaged more than 8,000 houses and 40,000 acres of farmland.

Resources Plan Given State Office Heads
Salem, June 16—Heads of departments of the state government have been handed, for study, a report of an interim legislative committee on natural resources. The report recommends that a nine-member board be appointed by the governor to head the proposed state department of natural resources.

State Rep. Ben Day, Gold Hill, was chairman of the committee.

Plans for the natural resources department have been formulated by the committee, but it says it has not endorsed the proposal, but has submitted plans for approval or criticism.

The committee will hold hearings throughout the state before the next meeting of the legislature to obtain recommendations and suggestions on the proposal.

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Search Pressed for Missing Opera Singer

Los Angeles, June 16—(U.P.) Authorities pressed their search today for a missing opera singer who vanished from her hotel three weeks ago believing "communists" were after her.

Anna Cuyle, 52, was the third prominent southern California woman to disappear in the last 10 months, but police emphasized they did not class her disappearance as the same type of wealthy socialite Mim Bohmower or actress Jean Spangler.

Miss Cuyle, whose real name was Dorothy Thompson, suffered from a persecution complex and moved from hotel to hotel in the belief "communists" were after her, reported Attorney J. B. Boyle, representing her mother, Mrs. Ella Thompson.

The singer disappeared May 29, Boyle said, and Mrs. Thompson hired private detectives to search for her.

Gulfport, Miss., June 16—(U.P.) Trunkers and longshoremen returned to work today ending at least temporarily a strike which had tied up the port here for six days.

Oakland Carmen Approve Agreement

Oakland, Cal., June 16—(U.P.) Local and transbay trains and buses operated as usual today after 1,800 AFL carmen voted to accept a package wage agreement, averting a threatened strike against the Key System lines.

The carmen accepted the wage offer shortly before a midnight deadline last night. The agreement, to run two years, provides a wage increase of 6 1/2 cents an hour.

The Key System operates the trains that cross the San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge, as well as local bus service in Oakland, Berkeley and other east bay communities.

The union had authorized a strike in the event agreement on a new contract was not reached. Federal conciliator Omar Hoskins said the increase included a straight 4-cent hourly pay raise, plus pension increases, a medical plan and other benefits estimated at 2 1/2 cents an hour.
