The nation's governing Labor party called today for Britain to keep out of further programs for European political and economic union until unity-minded continental nations turn socialist.

IN OTHER words:

Britain's socialist government says to the nations of Western Europe which are seeking the strength that comes with unity: "We can't wait for you until you turn to socialism, as we have done."

FROM Paris:

The French foreign office today expressed astonishment over the stand taken by Britain's Labor party against plans for political and economic unification of Western Europe.

"An official spokesman at the foreign office said: 'It is astonishing that the British Labor party should take such a position. We had not been led to expect anything like it by the reaction we had seen before. It is even more astonishing that the position is taken against the council of Europe even before the council of Europe meets.'"

Mythical Governor

Salem, Ore., June 16—(U.P.)—Ruth Joseph, a "federalist" from Weiser, Ida., who attends school in Ontario, Ore., yesterday was elected mythical governor in a two-party election for a dozen offices in the six-day girls' state convention on the Willamette university campus.

Creagh Brennan of Pendleton, a "nationalist," won the second post of secretary of state; Jo Ann Toikka of Astoria, a "federalist," was elected treasurer; Mary Hooker, Klamath Falls "nationalist," was named attorney general, and Ann Hill of Cottage Grove, a "nationalist," was elected labor commissioner.

In the non-partisan races Katherine Burlingham of Forest Grove, won the position of chief justice of the supreme court. Other justices are Ann Charles of Eugene, Barbara Russell of Toledo and Amy Reahmus of Portland.

Americans to Hear Information on Atomic Energy

Washington, June 16—(U.P.)—The atomic energy commission has decided to tell Americans some of the things Russians already know about atomic energy.

What it tells probably will be of value to industry and private research, an official said today, but it won't set off any sensations.

The public will know as little as now about weapon technology, stockpiles, and production rates.

Of more interest to the general public will be other atomic releases coming up in the next couple of months.

They will tell the public part of what it already has heard about H-bombs reactions, more than it presently knows about A-bomb blast effects, and quite a lot about radiation injury and how to treat it.

The other technical information for the most part will be scientific data relating to atomic reactors—the machines for making atomic power, explosives, or both.

It won't be shoved out in one package and won't in any way compare to the famous Smyth report on the A-bomb which was put out in 1945. The information will be released gradually. The declassification mills grind slowly.

The decision to release more reactor information is based on the simple fact that Russia obviously already possesses it and so there is no point in keeping it from Americans.
