

Rogues Lose to Silver Sox; Return Here Tuesday Night

Medford Rogues will open a four-game Far West league series at Pittsburg, Cal., tonight with single games this evening and Saturday and a twin bill on Sunday. The Rogues return to Medford next Tuesday to meet Willows in a four-game series.

Reno, Nev., June 16.—(Special to Mail Tribune)—Capricious weather plus Reno Pitcher Pat Monahan backfired on the Medford Rogues last night and the Oregonians dropped an 8 to 3 Far West league decision.

Medford had jumped on Monahan for three runs in the first inning and sought an early halt to the rain-sprinkled game. The Rogues leading 3 to 1 in the fourth stanza deliberately bunted out to the pitcher to speed up play as the pouring rain increased.

Rain Nearly Halts
It looked for a few minutes like a repetition of Wednesday's game when Medford won 3 to 1 in a rain-shortened game.

But the weather suddenly improved and so did Monahan. Rain stopped, play went on and Monahan fed the Medford club eight consecutive scoreless innings.

Reno retrieved victory with a seven-run outburst in the seventh inning.

Starter LaVerre Herrmann for the Rogues was touched for three straight hits in that seventh inning after he had allowed six scattered hits and one run up to that time.

Central Point to Play Sunday at Home Field

Central Point, June 16.—Roseburg semi-pro baseball club invades Central Point for a game with the Studs Sunday which will determine the first place team in the Southern Oregon Baseball league. Both teams are now tied for first place with four wins and no losses.

These teams are probably the top semi-pro teams in the state and will give the fans of Southern Oregon a chance to see a game as good as any in the state of Oregon.

Roseburg has a record with ten wins and no defeats while the Studs have eight wins and

one defeat for the season. Buzz Sporer is leading pitcher for the Roseburg Chiefs. He is down from the Western International league, having pitched for Salem and Victoria for five years. Against Grants Pass in a non-league game he struck out 22 batters. He will be opposed by the Studs' ex-major leaguer, Paul Gehrmann.

Roseburg also has three former Central Point and Medford Craters ball players, John (Tex) Chandler, catcher; Cy Whidden, pitcher, and Stan Norby, second baseman.

Manager Hoosier Hoffard of Central Point says that his squad will be at its peak and will pick his team from the following players:

Infielders: Don Fawcett, George Giltzen, Freddy Stammen and Dint Cox; outfielders: Moose Blevins, Norm Lucich and Clarence Melby, when not pitching. Catching duties will be handled by former Oregon State college catcher, Frank Roelandt. Game time is 2 p.m.

Favor USC Track Team
Minneapolis, June 16.—(U.P.)—Southern California's bid for its 14th national collegiate track crown gets its first test today in 10 preliminary trials against top flight stars from both big and little schools from every section of the country.

The 19-man Trojan team, defending champions for the 29th annual collegiate carnival, were rated as prime contenders because of three men, Distance Runner Jim Newcombe, Hurdler Dick Attlesley and Discus Thrower Sim Iness.

Fairgrounds Field, Stand Improvement

Baseball fans going out to the fairgrounds park next week when the Rogues return to town to open a long home stay against Willows and Marysville, will see several changes and improvements to the grandstand, field and concessions.

Yesterday and today construction of a concession booth at the south end of the grandstand was being done. This will give fans quicker service and will make it easier for them to obtain refreshments than it has been since the center entrance was closed.

Fans sitting in back of home plate will receive more protection from batted and wild thrown balls than previously with the addition of a thicker and heavier wire screen immediately back of the plate.

Work on Diamond
Workmen at the field also are getting the diamond back in shape following the recent Sheriff's Posse roundup. The outfield sector was little touched by horses' hoofs but the infield grass has needed replanting in many spots and hoof marks removed by rolling.

The workers are also putting in new topsoil on the infield so newly planted grass may take root. Some of this already is showing above the ground but it is not expected to be back in top shape in time for next Tuesday's opening game with Willows.

A committee from Rogue Valley Baseball, Inc., sponsors of the Medford Rogues, and the Sheriff's Posse worked out an agreement earlier this year on use of the grounds.

N.Y., Browns Trade Made
St. Louis, June 16.—(U.P.)—The regular season ban on player deals clamped down on the major leagues today, with only the St. Louis Browns and New York Yankees beating the deadline at midnight with a swap.

The Browns and Yanks swapped eight players in what Brownie President William DeWitt called "a \$500,000" deal but other baseball men viewed more cheaply.

The Yanks, seeking pitching strength in their efforts to repeat as world champions, obtained two hurlers—30-year-old Joe Ostrowski and 35-year-old Tom Ferrick—plus two players for their Kansas City farm team, Pitcher Sid Schacht and infielder Leo Thomas.

In return the Yanks gave up infielder George Stinnett; the American League batting king in 1945 with a mark of .309 but no longer a regular, rookie outfielder Jim Delsing, and Pitchers Don Jolan and Duane Pillette. And—\$50,000 in cash.

Little Paces Golf Tourney
New Rochelle, N. Y., June 16 (U.P.)—Veteran Lawson Little, still fit and fairway-fine at 40, had the nation's younger golf stars at his heels and said he aimed to keep them there today in the second and third rounds of the \$15,000 round robin tournament.

The husky, greying iron-ace from Monterey, Cal., played some of the finest golf of his career yesterday over the rain-drenched Wykagyl course to card a stylish five-under-par 67.

His performance, which included seven birdies, gave him a point total of plus 15 and a comfortable four point margin over curly-haired Jack Burke Jr., of White Plains, N. Y., who was runner-up with plus 11 thanks to his flashy 69.

While everything that Little hit turned to birdies, everything national open champion Ben Hogan hit appeared to go awry. Hampered more than the others by the slick, wet underfooting, Hogan, along with George Fazio of Washington, wound up with the day's poorest score of 76.

Fishing at Lake o' Woods is better than ever with the fish caught this past week being 15 to 15 inches long, a report from the resort said today. Cold weather last week made fishing poor but warmer weather since has improved the sport.

People going to the resort report fast traveling over the Dead Indian road and say improvements being made to the road have shortened the time it takes.

Portland, Ore., June 16.—(U.P.)—Weekend fishing will be fair in most sections of Oregon, except for some sections of Willamette valley, the state game commission said today.

Recent heavy rains were blamed for most poor conditions.

Coastal section—Trout fishing is slow throughout the coastal area.

Basin and pan fish angling is good in most of lakes. Surf and bay fishing for sea perch, flounder and kelp fish is good. Salmon fishing on lower Rogue continues poor.

Upper Umpqua—Water conditions are fair. Streams are generally high but dropping and clearing rapidly. Trout fishing is good. Bait is most productive but some good catches are being made on wet flies.

Fish lake has produced some nice catches of eastern brook trout.

Klamath area — Fishing in Klamath river remains good, frequent limit catches have been reported. Wood river has produced near limit catches on fly. Agency and upper Klamath lakes have been fair on troll. Diamond lake has been fair to poor with most of trout caught on artificial lures.
