### McKenzie Highway Opened to Travel

Bend, Ore., June 17—(U.P.)—The McKenzie highway was opened to travel over the Cascade summit Friday permitting a flow of traffic between Central Oregon points and Eugene.

However, motorists were cautioned that water covers the highway in two places west of the lava fields. In one spot the water was six inches deep this morning.

Load limits are in effect, in an attempt to keep the roadbed from being damaged.

Snow was removed from the mile-high road last week, but barriers at the east and west approaches to the divide were kept in place because of water conditions. Drainage from melting snow was impossible because of water-soaked drifts along the high cuts, it was explained.

### Death in K. Falls Now Said Suicide

Klamath Falls, Ore., June 17 (U.P.)—The death of Pete Swanson, 60, found Wednesday night in an irrigation ditch near here was termed a suicide today by Sheriff Jack Franey.

Earlier, Coroner George Adler said the man was murdered. Franey said Swanson was a Weyerhaeuser employee and was despondent since a strike closed down the mill. Penniless, the elderly man had attempted suicide earlier.

After investigation, Franey said, Swanson apparently jumped off a bridge near Klamath Union high school into the irrigation ditch, which carried the body 14 miles before it was discovered. This accounts for the bruises and lacerations on the body, he added.

Swanson was believed to have been dead five days before his body was discovered.

## Grange Farm Ideas Favored by Oregon Over Brannan Plan

Ontario, Ore., June 17—(U.P.)—Delegates by a two to one majority favored the national Grange program for supporting farm prices over the Brannan plan here Friday following a debate on the controversial issue.

The vote was taken after a long debate between Brannan plan backer E. H. Spoor, California rancher and chairman of the California state committee of the U. S. Production and Marketing administration, and Albert Goss, national master of the Grange, defending the Grange plan.

Both sides—Goss and Spoor—agreed the present farm support program was a poor one but went to great length in defending an individual plan to replace it.

Spoor, who appeared upon Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan's behalf, favored the Brannan plan and its production payments as a means of reducing prices and increasing consumption of meat, milk, eggs and other protective foods, thus improving the national diet.

The Californian said the plan would treat all commodities equitably, would add no new controls, would create no new bureau and probably would cost no more.

**Expanding Market**  
Goss pointed to the Grange plan as a means of expanding markets, giving both fixed and flexible price supports and two price systems, while keeping production controls and production payments.

The national master said the Brannan plan actually was inflationary, because the estimated \$10,000,000,000 to \$12,000,000,000 annual cost would have to be raised through higher taxes which in turn would have to be passed on to consumers through higher prices on goods.

The debate came about after retiring State Master Morton Tomkins had urged the convention to support a "trial run" of the Brannan plan.

## Real Irish Souvenirs Are To Be Restored

Dublin—(U.P.)—Two Irishmen have declared war on bogus souvenirs, a flourishing racket for clipping gullible tourists, and intend to replace them with the real thing.

Not so long ago, dollar-happy tourists visiting Ireland brought home "genuine" souvenirs of the Emerald Isle, made in Japan. In Glendalough, ancient capital of Ireland, and happy hunting ground for the "little men," tourists were sold a wide variety of jewelry and leprechauns made

in Czechoslovakia, Germany or Japan.

George Lightfoot and Hamilton Jenkins intend to give the tourists a "new deal." They will use an old craft called the "lost wax process" which

will result not alone in Irish-made souvenirs, but ones that are always works of art.
