Chance for Peace Better Than War, Romulo Decides

Manila—(U.P.)—President Carlos P. Romulo of the United Nations general assembly made up a "balance sheet" on the prospects for war or peace, and decided that the chances for peace were better.

The usually optimistic Filipino diplomat admitted, on his recent return from Lake Success, that the score was close. But, he said, he is banking on the fact that most people want peace and are working hard to preserve it.

Romulo's own outline of forces for war or peace follows:

1. Continuation of the cold war, with accompanying armaments race, formation and strengthening of hostile alliances, and indulgence in aggressive moves and postures.
2. Failure of the great powers (mainly as a consequence of the cold war) to settle such unresolved issues as peace treaties for Germany, Austria and Japan, final disposition of Trieste, and unification of Korea.
3. The China issue, over which the great powers are split and which has caused partial paralysis of the UN. The China problem also deeply perturbs Asia.
4. Conflicts caused by efforts to restore or maintain colonial control, typified by the situation in Indo-China.
5. Widespread economic distress aggravated by political conflicts which hamper remedial efforts and promote trade war instead of essential economic collaboration among nations.
6. Deliberate and systematic exploitation of local or national conflicts in attempts by some powers to gain world domination.

Widow in Peru Does Well on \$27 Monthly

Memphis, Tenn.—(U.P.)—One surviving pensioner of the Civil War is the 99-year-old widow of the famous diplomat La Pointe, who later became American consul in Peru.

As a widow of an American war veteran, she receives about \$27 a month. Because of a favorable Peruvian rate of exchange at 20 soles to the dollar, she finds it to be an adequate income.

Her grandson, Oswald Tudela of Lima, Peru, said during a visit here that "she lives well on it and even gives some to her family."

La Pointe, a native of Boston, won acclaim in Peru for boldly raising an American flag over a mill to prevent possible slaughter of its occupants by an invading army from Chile in 1879.

"The people were so grateful they named a street after him and have erected a monument to him," Tudela said.

'Blowing Off Steam' Ends Family Dispute

Cleveland, O.—(U.P.)—A new method of handling family assault and battery cases here has reduced the number by 30 per cent, Municipal Judge Lillian M. Westropp reported after a six-week trial of the idea.

The "new deal" in domestic relations involves turning over complaints to a social worker, Harry S. Gilman, who says he just gives the disputants a chance to blow off steam. It has been found particularly effective in husband vs. wife situations.

Judge Westropp said that of the last 48 cases Gilman handled only one warrant has been requested.

"That's how it should be," Judge Westropp said, "since a criminal court is no place for family disputes."

Town to Restore Colonial Charm

New Castle, Del.—(U.P.)—This Delaware river community of 6,000 is going "all out" on plans to restore the town to the full glory of colonial days when New Castle was an important shipping center. It already has as many physically aspects of colonial life as any town in the nation.

A committee of leading citizens formed Historic New Castle, Inc., a group which wants to remove any historically false adornments of additions for some 150 old buildings in the heart of town. Many of the structures have retained much of their 1680-1830 style of architecture.

Some persons already have started to change the old dwellings and places of business to their original appearance. They are guided by a report by the Boston architectural firm of Perry, Shaw and Hepburn, the concern which handled the restoration of colonial Williamsburg, Va.

One of the biggest restoration jobs is the 243-year-old Presbyterian church building. The task will cost \$70,000.

Eugene Man To Face Kidnap, Theft Count

St. Paul, Minn.—June 17—(U.P.) Carl Stout, 35, Eugene, Ore., waived examination today when he was arraigned before Municipal Judge James C. Otis Jr., on charges of kidnapping and highway robbery.

The charges were in connection with the abduction of 18-year-old Joanne Brown, St. Paul, last week. She charged Stout forced her to enter his car at gunpoint and raped her twice. He was bound over to the district court without bond.

Army Depot Blaze Causes \$300,000 Loss in New York

Voorheesville, N. Y., June 17—(U.P.)—A stubborn blaze swept through a large warehouse at the U. S. army depot here and damaged another at an estimated loss of \$300,000.

Fire companies from six nearby cities and communities brought the flames under control after a three-hour battle.

The blaze, accompanied by several explosions, burned a section of the steel and brick warehouse No. 5, containing general army stocks, oil drums and quantities of small ammunition.

Cause of the blaze was not determined, firemen said. Observers said they heard the explosions and saw huge clouds of black smoke curl up from as far away as five miles. Flames leaped six to 10 times taller than the buildings. A fire-wall prevented the flames from spreading to other parts of the warehouse.

A strong wind which whipped the flames suddenly changed and helped keep the fire from spreading.

One fireman was injured battling the blaze.

Salem Births Exceed Deaths So Far in 1950

Salem, Ore., June 17—(U.P.)—Salem's health department looked over its statistics today and found a few worthy of new records in the births category.

Since the first of the year, births have exceeded deaths three times over, and there were 132 more births during the first five months of this year than for the same period in 1949.

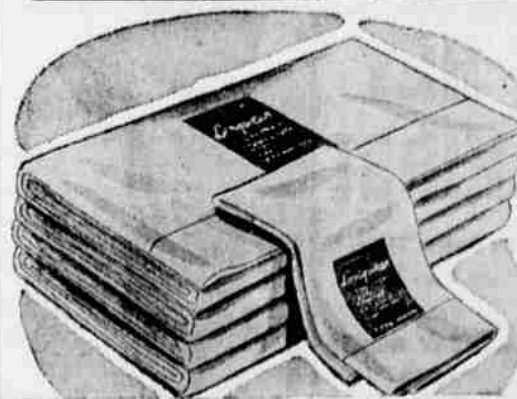
