

School Board Elections, Meetings Set In County, City; Three Candidates Here

Tomorrow, June 19, is annual school meeting day all over Oregon. School districts, rural school districts and non-high school districts will fill any existing vacancies on their boards of directors, give financial reports and answer questions about school matters generally.

From 3 p.m. until 9 p.m. (DST) tomorrow voters in Medford will one director to succeed John P. John P. Moffat whose term has expired. They will have three candidates to choose from—Mrs. Moore Hamilton, Dunbar Carpenter, and Dr. Leroy Jensen. Ballots may be cast in the girls' gymnasium at the senior high school.

Eligibility Told
Eligible to vote in school elections are all registered voters who have resided in the district for at least six months. There are no longer any property-holding qualifications.

The boundaries of the Medford school district are so rambling and irregular they defy description. At no point do they correspond to the city limits—they extend beyond the official boundaries of the city in all directions. Roughly, the district extends almost to the Jacksonville-Phoenix highway on the south and west to Orchard Home drive, Cherry street and Ross lane. On the north the boundary goes to, but does not include, the Berrydale addition. East of town the district goes just beyond Black Oak drive, cutting back past the Odd Fellows cemetery and then extending south to include Charlotte Ann road.

Now First Class District
Central Point, June 17—Consolidated district No. 6 officially becomes a first class district.

Cause of Death Eyed Josephine Hospital
Grants Pass, Ore., June 17 (U.P.)—Patricia Harder, three-week-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Burt Harder of Ingleswood, Cal., was pronounced dead on arrival at Josephine General hospital yesterday and the cause of death was not immediately determined.

The child had been asleep on the rear shelf of her parents' car. Josephine county sheriff's officers said Mrs. Harder rushed the infant to the hospital when she noticed "something was wrong."

No Power Seizure
As far as I can see, there will not be any seizure of power by a group of well-armed dissidents in the Philippines whose original battle cry was for agrarian reforms but who have since shown themselves to be partisans of the communist movement that is sweeping down to southeast Asia from the north.

Neither do I believe there is any imminent external threat to the Philippines, regardless of what happens to the Chinese Nationalist forces on Formosa unless the situation should spill over into a global conflict.

I have lived in the United States for a long time and I have been a journalist for more than 20 years. As a result, I can understand how such reports, read in the context of a world in crisis, may sometimes assume a character of exaggerated alarm.

Frequent Visitor
But I have been a frequent visitor to the Philippines during the past four years and I have just returned from there after acquainting myself with local conditions even more intimately than usual as secretary of for-

Philippines Republic in No Danger of Collapse

Washington, June 17—(U.P.)—The Philippines republic is in no danger of collapse today but is bravely and consistently pulling itself out of the deep morass into which it was plunged by the war and the Japanese occupation.

The Philippines, as part of the ailing two-thirds of the world and because of its proximity to the shooting war in Asia, faces serious problems. But American press reports that the government is near collapse are at worst fantastic and at best exaggerated.

Under Criticism
The government is under constant criticism. This is because our press is free and public opinion untrammelled. We have no censorship of any kind and President Quirino has pledged that there shall be none so long as he is president.

Much of the criticism arises from an impatient call for swift action from a people who have lived through danger and chaos for four years of the Japanese occupation and through four years of painful reorganization after liberation and who, perhaps, are entitled to feel impatient.

We have rich natural resources, some of our export products are in heavy demand in the world markets and, under normal conditions, we would have rebuilt our war-ravaged economy in a much shorter time than it will take us.

People Cooperating
But the public was not born in a world where it was easy to return to normal peacetime patterns. However, the great bulk of our people, realizing the perils of this alien ideology, are beginning to cooperate more effectively.

The Philippines need help from the United States and from other friendly nations. But it is not so desperate that it will pay any price for such help.

The suggestion, which has been made by some of our so-called "friends," to the effect that the United States should return and resume its sovereignty over the Philippines, is generally looked upon by our people as un-American.

If our friends in America really want to help us, they must do so under just and honorable conditions which will enable the Filipino people to remain what they are today—America's best and most loyal friends in all of Asia.

school and the gymnasium at the Gold Hill school. Ballots may be cast from 3 p.m. until 9 p.m. (DST) at both polls.

It had been planned previously to open bids Monday on construction of the district's new school, but Superintendent H. P. Jewett said yesterday that the bid opening has been postponed until Saturday, June 24, at 3 p.m.

Rural School Districts
School districts outside Medford, Ashland and Central Point are known as rural school districts. In addition to naming directors for their own local boards, many of the districts will also elect directors to the rural school board and the non-high school board.

The rural school board is a taxing body set up to administer and levy a county-wide equalized tax based on the combined budgets of all second and third class districts. Its functions are limited to fiscal matters and it has no authority over other school matters. There are two vacancies on the rural board to be filled at tomorrow's election and only two candidates have

filed. Dr. George B. Dean is seeking reelection in Zone 4 of the district and H. F. Padgham Jr. is the candidate in Zone 3. **Non-High School**

The non-high school district includes all individual districts that do not have high schools. The non-high board handles transportation and tuition payments for high school students in the district who must attend high school in other districts.

There is one vacancy on the board—for the director from Zone 5—and the only candidate is Carl Quackenbush.

Election times in the second and third class districts are not set by law, and most of the rural schools hold their annual meetings and elections in the evening. Most of the rural schools have not reported their meeting times. Lone Pine District 10, however, has announced its meeting will be held at the school at 8 p.m. (DST).

Phoenix Election Set
Phoenix, June 17—Election of a school board director and a property disposition proposal will be on the agenda at the annual meeting of the Phoenix school district at the grade school gymnasium on Monday, June 19, at 8 p.m. standard time (9 p.m. daylight time).

The board term of Chairman Walter Germer expires. No one has filed for the post and nominations as well as election will be held.

A vote will be taken to determine whether the board may dispose of the Fern Valley and North Phoenix school tracts. According to law, voters must authorize the sale of school real property.

1st Christian Church Bible School Meets
The Daily Vacation Bible school being conducted at the First Christian church will enter its second and final week Monday at 9 a.m.

Total average attendance last week was between 95 and 100. The number of teachers and helpers who have given service in the departments ranging from nursery to intermediates is 23.

A closing program and demonstration of the school will be held Friday, June 23, in the sanctuary of the church at 8 p.m. All parents and friends of the children will be welcome to this service.
