Echols, Halsey Fight For National Title

Wes Echols, national AAU middleweight boxing champion, of Atwater, Cal., and Bull Halsey, Portland, Ore., are on the scene for their national championship match at the armory tomorrow night and both scheduled light workouts for today.

4 Deadlocked Skeet Shoot At Reno Club

Reno, Nev., June 17—(U.P.)—Four shooters were deadlocked today at the half-way point of the 200-target all gauge match, final event of the four-day Great Pacific Skeet Shoot now underway here.

Four class AA shooters shot perfect 100x100 scores for their first 100 targets—G. W. Shillett and J. Garrison of Joplin, Mo., Ed Castagnetto of San Francisco, and H. P. Cady, an aviation ordinance man (first class) from the San Diego naval air station.

Don Heidman of Reno led the class A division with a perfect 100x100, as did Clark Smith of Phoenix in the B class. Another perfect 100x100 score was registered by Maurice Humber, Reno, to lead class C competitors.

Lou Capurro, Reno, led the class D shooters with 98x100 and Ed O'Connor, Stockton, Cal., was out in front in class E with 83x100.

The defending champion, Bob Brooks of Reno, formerly of Yoncalla, Ore., shot a 99x100 in the class AA division. Yesterday, he broke 215 targets without a miss to win the 20 gauge competition.

San Francisco, June 17—(U.P.)—Six runs in the first inning off two Portland pitchers allowed the San Francisco Seals to coast the rest of the way and take their third Pacific Coast league baseball victory of the week, 6 to 1.

Manny Perez allowed five hits to gain his second win of the season against two losses.

The big San Francisco inning started off Beaver Hurler Red Lynn, who was ushered out of the contest after allowing two hits, three walks and two runs.

With the bases loaded, Lynn Linde took over and allowed four more Seals to come home.

Seals' big day: Holder, Les Fleming and Jack Conway contributed to the parade of scores.

Portland's lone run came in the second when Perez walked Johnny Ritchey, batted him to second and gave a single to Frank Austin, scoring Ritchey.

USC Cops Honors In College Meet

Minneapolis, June 17—(U.P.)—Southern California won only one event in the 29th annual NCAA track and field meet today but the Trojans still landed enough star athletes in point-rich second places to capture the national collegiate crown for the 14th time with 49½ markers.

Dick Attlessey, Southern California's hurdle star, triumphed in the 120-yard high hurdles for the Trojans' only individual title, but his job of scoring 18 points for the day was outlasted by record-breaking performances by Yale's Jim Fuchs, Michigan's Don McEwen and a one-man track team from North Carolina.

Albans Helps School

Albans, the only North Carolina competitor, lifted his school into fourth place in all three events he entered for a total of 22 points. He outspurred Attlessey to win the 220-yard low hurdle and finished third in the 120-yard high hurdles and in the broad jump.

Fuchs turned in his second record-shattering job in the shot put in as many days. He heaved the ball 56 feet 11 3/8 inches today to break his own mark of 56 feet 7 1/2 inches established yesterday. He set the previous NCAA mark last year with a throw of 56 feet 1 1/2 inches.

McEwen, a Canadian who took up track because he couldn't play hockey, broke Greg Rice's 11-year-old two-mile record of 9:02.6 in whipping Southern California's touted Jim Newcomb easily.

McEwen was timed at 9:01.9 and went the second mile faster than the first to hold an edge of more than 100 yards at the finish line.

Stanford, boosted by Don Anderson's two second places in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and Franklin Held's winning throw in the javelin, won second place with 28 points.

Yale, aided by Fuchs' work, was third with 27 markers while Morgan State, a little Negro school in Baltimore, won two events to tie the California for fifth with 20 points.

MITRI, Lamotta Fight Possible

New York, June 17—(U.P.)—Negotiations were almost completed today for unbeaten Tiberio Mitrì of Italy to substitute for Rocky Graziano in a mid-dewlight championship fight against titleholder Jake Lamotta, June 28.

Hary Markson, general manager of the International Boxing club, said he hoped to be able to announce the completed match tomorrow. Graziano withdrew from the title bout Friday because of a fractured left thumb.

Markson said James D. Norris, president of the IBC, was scheduled to confer again tomorrow afternoon with Lamotta.

No details of the terms involved in the negotiations were announced. For the Lamotta-Graziano match, each principal was to have received 30 per cent of the next gate.

Lithians Play Rogue River At Ashland Park Today

Ashland, June 17—Ashland Lithians will play host to Rogue River's town team in a Southern Oregon Baseball league game at the Ashland high field Sunday at 2 p.m. Several changes in the Ashland lineup will be seen since the Lithians played on May 30.

Ashland's semi-pro team has been idle since losing to the Cheney Stude 15 to 10 on Memorial day. Rogue River, a newcomer to the Southern Oregon league, has not won a game as yet but recently held mighty Roseburg to a 6 to 3 decision.

Washington Crews Win Intercollegiate Races

Marietta, O., June 17—(U.P.)—Washington's precision-powered Huskies scored their fourth sweep of the river in the 48th intercollegiate rowing regatta today when they swept down the

mud-yellowed Ohio to varsity, junior varsity and freshman triumphs.

It was Washington all the way in each of the three races as Al Ulbricksen's Huskies conquered California's Golden Bears, the best the east could throw at them and the surprising varsity bid of Wisconsin's river-borne Badgers.

Race Distance Shortened

The classic was shortened from three miles to two miles because of a flash flood which littered the river with debris.

The Huskies are the only crew which ever was able to sweep all three events of this rowing extravaganza—having done it before in 1936, 1937 and 1948—and they showed again today they had another crew of destiny.

Officials decided to shorten the usual three-mile race by a mile, moving the start downriver below the boiling juncture of the two streams.

Washington took it from there.

Freshmen Win First

As 30,000 spectators jammed the banks of the river and a 40-car observation train followed the race along the Ohio bank, the freshman crew drove to a two-length triumph over Navy and Cornell in a start which was delayed 45 minutes by the soaring river.

Coast guard and army engineers had shoved most of the debris to the side of the river, where the flow was about four miles per hour, when Washington's junior varsity made it a double. The Husky JV's scored by a length and a half over California with Navy third.

Then came the big race, with the sun sinking behind the Ohio hills, and the issue wasn't long in doubt. Washington was in front from the starting gun to the finish line, as Wisconsin stayed alongside for a half mile and then was unable to match the steady, grueling pace of the rangy Washington sweepers.

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Cards Lose To Dodgers

New York, June 17—(U.P.)—The St. Louis Cardinals ran into the national league's probable starting battery in next month's annual all-star game today and found the experience equally discouraging to the American league's chances and their own pennant hopes.

Shuffling Don Newcombe and pudge Roy Campanella, the National league's outstanding battery, combined to jolt the Redbirds 10 to 2, and move the Brooklyn Dodgers to within a game and a half of first place.

Newcombe threw aspirin tablets at Stan Musial and company, striking out eight and allowing five hits while Campanella knocked in two runs with a single and his 14th homer of the season.

Ted Gray stifled a ninth-inning rally to hurl the Detroit Tigers to a 2 to 1 victory over the Boston Red Sox and increase the Bengals' American league lead to 2½ games over the New York Yankees, who lost to the St. Louis Browns, 7 to 3.

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
