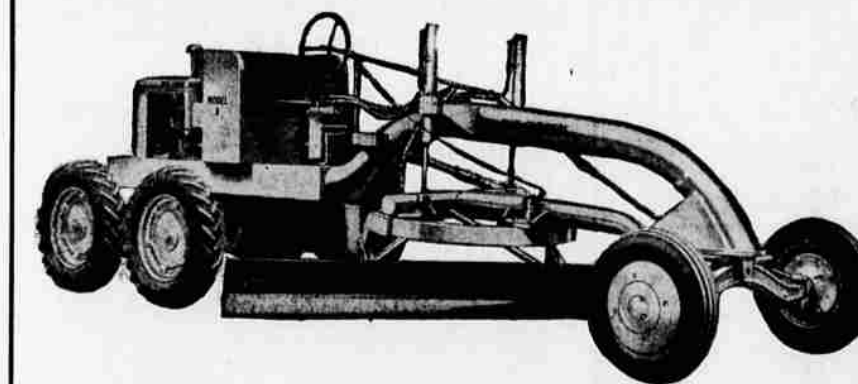

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Noor Defeats Citation at Golden Gate

Albany, Cal., June 17—(U.P.)—The great Irish-bred Noor whipped Citation for the third time in a row today as he came from far back on the home stretch to win the \$10,000 Forty-Niner handicap at Golden Gate Fields.

Given a championship ride by veteran jockey Johnny Longden the coal-black Noor came whipping down the straightaway to set a new world's record for the mile and one-eighth of 1:46 4/5.

Noor won by a neck from Citation with Roman 11, a thoroughbred that beat Citation last month, a close third.

Although the victory went to Noor it was proof again that it takes a world championship performance to beat Citation.

The Calumet colt set a new world record for the mile two weeks ago in winning here and today's time again indicated the speed of the local turf.
