

Lady Lions Fashion Show Highlight of Convention

Women seem always to enjoy a fashion show, and the one planned by Medford Lady Lions for the pleasure of delegates attending the annual convention of Lady Lions proved to be one of the highlights of the session. It followed a luncheon at the Rogue Valley Country club Monday noon, and was an interesting combination of present and past fashions.

Models were Lady Lions and their daughters, and opening the show was Miss Diane Fries wearing a sun dress brought from Hawaii. It was of white, with design of green. Another Hawaiian sports ensemble was modeled by Miss Phyllis Neely, who wore peddle pushers of Fuji silk with Camisa coat of matching fabric. These also were of white and green.

The show closed with wedding dresses of long ago and today. Mrs. J. W. Wickman was the bride of yesterday, wearing her mother's wedding gown, 65 years old, of grey crepe made with a close-fitting bodice and a bustle. Mrs. Williams was the bridegroom wearing "white tie and tails" and a curling mustache.

Mrs. M. J. Maulsby modeled a black nylon taffeta swim suit with side lacing, and a white terry-cloth beach coat, while Mrs. William Bacon afforded a contrast by appearing in a 1900 bathing suit. This modest little black outfit had knee-length pantaloons gathered just below the knee, a short-sleeved middie blouse top and was worn with a ruffled bathing cap and stockings with white ruffles around the top.

An aquamarine colored afternoon dress with matching bolero jacket was worn by Mrs. Robert Morris and Mrs. Larry Schade Jr., followed her on the program wearing an heirloom flannel and lace dress of egg-shell color with high neck, tight sleeves and many, many buttons. Mrs. Schade carried a black satin parasol and wore black shoes of the same period as the dress.

Mrs. Arlon Skinner appeared in a frock of taffeta rose Pima cloth, a sheer cotton, with plaid skirt and a velvet belt, the use of velvet with cotton being one of this season's newest fashions. She was followed by Mrs. L. J. Cox wearing a cotton print with black lace trim that was doubtless very fashionable in the days of "My Merry Oldsmobile," which was the song Abby Green played as Mrs. Cox paraded among the luncheon tables.

Mrs. Tom Flynn modeled a classic shirtmaker type dress of rose colored Saloniak and in contrast with this present day style Mrs. Alvin Perkins appeared in an old-fashioned afternoon gown of beige and black moire worn with a big picture hat with long plume. When Mrs. Perkins raised the hem of this frock a little she revealed striped hose and high-laced shoes. She also carried an heirloom purse, an alligator bag more than 100 years old belonging to Mrs. Flynn.

Another gown which brought exclamations from the audience was a chintz formal dress modeled by Mrs. Skinner. Red strawberries were printed on a black background and the belt was of red velvet.

She was followed in the fashion parade by Mrs. Schade wearing a gown from the era of "flappers" with shingled hair, the dress being a black chiffon, heavily beaded. The cloche she wore, however, was not unlike those shown this spring.
