Largest Group of Ex-Servicemen Since GI Bill Became Effective Graduating

 The largest group of ex-servicemen since the GI bill of rights became effective is graduating this month from colleges and universities and there are jobs available for the go-getters, educators said today.

The GI bill expires July 25, 1950, after which all training must be completed. The deadline for enrollment is July 25, 1951. This year's crop of GI graduates hits the peak, since the heaviest matriculation was in 1946 after the war ended.

Quarters To Disappear
 From now on tarpaper shacks, trailer homes and baby buggies will begin to disappear from college campuses.

The total university enrollment this year was 2,456,000, 35 per cent of which was ex-servicemen and women, a 15 per cent drop from 1947. And 40 to 50 per cent of this June's history-making class are veterans.

That leaves only a taken few of the mass of ex-GI students who entered during and after the great demobilization after the war to carry on next fall.

The impact of this huge mass of job hunters on the business world and the hole they leave in the schools poses some problems, but school officials said the situation isn't desperate.

No Recruiting Programs
 The schools won't have to start any large-scale recruiting

programs to replace the veterans and, as the placement director at Indiana university explained, "there are plenty of jobs for those who go out and get them."

However, the job situation varies with the locality.

On the Pacific coast, Margaret G. Vandever, director of vocational guidance at Occidental college, Los Angeles, said that "after a slow and depressing winter, the employment picture brightened suddenly and surprisingly several weeks ago."

"Also, surprisingly," she said, "beginning salaries are higher than they were a year ago. Two years ago the going rate was \$200 per month, last year \$225 and this year it's been about \$240."

Opportunities Tighten
 The University of Missouri said "there was a tightening of job opportunities." Marquette university said it had little trouble placing grads in business administration and other specialized fields but "employers don't want graduates untrained in special fields."

Rutgers university officials at New Brunswick, N. J., summed up the feeling of many place-up people, commenting, "Ex-GIs have better chance for employment since they are more mature, which adds to their quality."

The enrollment for next fall is not expected to be a problem

since most schools are beginning to reap the harvest of students born after the depression when the birth rate started to go up. They expect to receive more and more of these. The census bureau predicts that enrollment in primary and secondary schools will jump by 1,000,000 next year.

Situation Acute
 The immediate situation in smaller colleges, however, is acute. Of 143 graduates at Washash college, Indiana, 94 were veterans. The school said it was "reviving prewar efforts to attract students."

The University of Mississippi also said it was reviving efforts to attract students and already has sent out a field man for recruiting purposes. The southern school also is using mailing pieces, brochures and a color motion picture in the high schools.

But most great state universities, like Illinois, Wisconsin, Oregon, North Carolina, Utah, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Louisiana, said they are doing nothing extraordinary to attract students to fill up the GI vacancy.

 The men of the furniture industry boast of their commercial concern with the blushing bride and the young wife and mother. Their advertising literature features such items as the "Brides-love Bedroom Suite," the "Security-Kid's High Chair," and "Lullabye Children's Furniture."

In a booklet on the latter line the firm has a series of illustrations that range from its own timber through the finished product. The pictures are captioned "Lullabye Timber," "Hauling Lullabye Logs," "Lullabye Sawmill," and so on.

By odd tradition, lumber industry trade promotion was stodgy, stuffy and pompous. Now the theme of the West Coast Lumbermen's association's new motion picture in color may be stated as something like this, "Hi-yah, Bride! Come See What Paul Bunyan Has for You, Baby!"

Now I dream of a magazine spread with a picture of a gay wolf of a logger looking like a movie actor, and shown enticing a lovely bride to yield to the charms of "Darling Douglas Fir" for her new home.

Let such an advertisement have menace. Let it strongly suggest that husbands come to hate the materials. And then say, "Keep your man—play safe with Darling Douglas Fir for your new home—America's love, lumber."

I dream of that, but I don't really expect it for some time.

Lumber's Market Month
 So June, the month of brides, is the market month for lumber.

Oregon Labor Voes Against Endorsement

La Grande, Ore., June 19—(U.P.)—After heated debate the Oregon state federation of labor will maintain its independence in political endorsements and legislative programs it was made known here Saturday.

A resolution to unite all labor in a common cause, merging the AFL programs with those of the CIO and the Railroad Brotherhood was tabled.

The convention endorsed the Brannan plan unanimously, called for stricter laws against sex crimes and affirmed its non-partisan position in politics. The federation reaffirmed and adopted a resolution which declared that it "reiterates its traditional policy of nonpartisanship in politics and urges all affiliates to jealously guard and defend its policy."

Agricultural Taxes Committee to Report

A sub-committee on tax problems, appointed last April by Chairman Henry Conger of the county agricultural committee, is scheduled to make the first report of its findings at a meeting in the county agents' office Wednesday at 8 p. m.

Inspection of Tax Returns Given Okay

Washington, June 19—(U.P.)—President Truman armed senate crime investigators today with power to inspect the confidential tax returns of big-time gamblers and racketeers.

Mr. Truman, in an executive order, gave the special crime investigating committee, excess profit, capital stock, estate and gift tax returns held by the treasury department's bureau of internal revenue.

Issuing the order requested by Committee Chairman Estes Kefauver (D., Tenn.) and his four colleagues, the president repeated his pledge of full cooperation to the committee.

"It is my desire that the executive branch of the government cooperate with the committee to the fullest possible extent," Mr. Truman said.

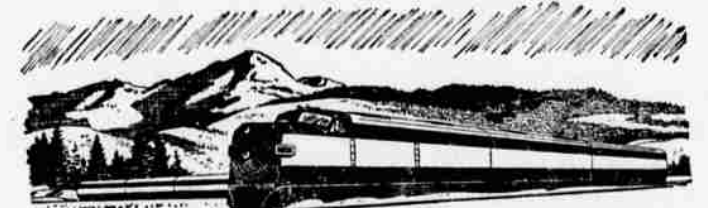
