

Medford Drops Two To Diamonds

Pittsburg, Cal., June 19—(Special to The Mail Tribune)—Medford's Rogues were victims of two heart-breaking defeats in Far West league baseball yesterday at Pittsburg. The Rogues lost the seven-inning opener 3 to 1 and the 11-inning nightcap 3 to 2 to the Diamonds.

Pittsburg gained a four-game clean sweep in the series as a result of the Sunday outcomes. The Diamonds won 10 to 8 Friday and 6 to 4 Saturday.

Medford returns to its home fairgrounds park Tuesday to begin a three-tiff series with Willows.

In both games yesterday the Rogues forged ahead in early innings only to see Pittsburg come from behind.

Lloyd Jones, pitching for Medford, gave up only four hits in the first game. He whiffed three and walked three. Medford got its lone run in the fifth inning when John Popovich homered over the left field fence.

Pittsburg collected two markers in the sixth. Cook singled. Enos was hit by a pitched ball and DiMaggio walked to fill the bases. Fraser singled, scoring Cook, and Goldstein walked, scoring Enos.

In the second game Dick Smith on the mound for Medford gave up seven hits, fanned four and walked two. He was also the Rogue batting star with a home run in the second inning and two singles for a three out of five batting record.

Russ Stuart walked in the first inning and Popovich singled. Charles Freeman forced out Stuart on a fielder's choice. Bob Haddock walked. Popovich was picked off second base for the second out but Don Williams singled to center field, scoring Freeman.

Pittsburg tallied in the second inning and tied the count in the eighth. The Diamonds won on Enos' homer in the 11th.

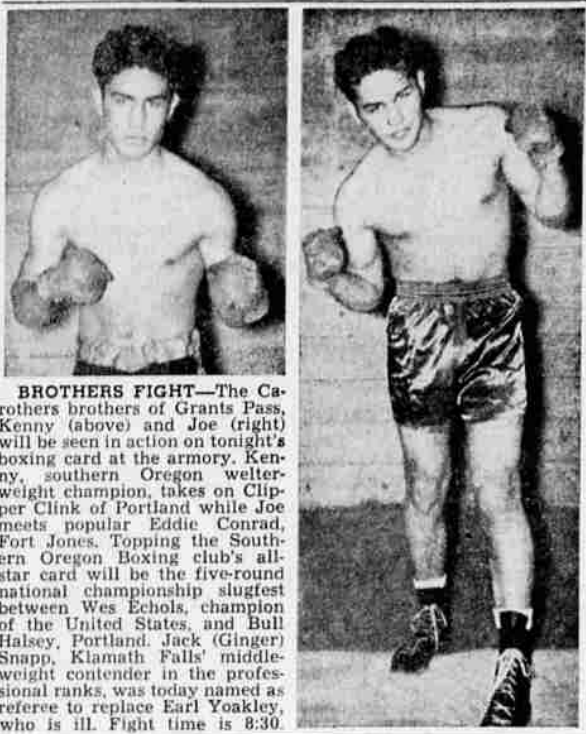

San Francisco, June 19—(U.P.)—Baseball bookkeeping fans whirled their pencil sharpeners in sheer glee after Sunday's Pacific Coast league double-headers.

The circuit was loaded with unusual baseball.
Of top interest were the 21 home runs blasted in the four twin bills, with 15 being knocked in the first three afternoon contests.

Beavers Get Three

The breakdown on the four-batters was Seattle eight, Portland and San Francisco three, Oakland, Los Angeles and Hollywood two and San Diego one. Sacramento alone had none.

A curious feat was performed by Seattle's Bill Schuster, Marv Rackley, Walt Judnich, George Vico and Ted Davis. Each blasted home runs in the first game, Davis getting two, only to find the Angels defeating them, 11 to 8. Lou Klein and Stan Spence homered for Los Angeles.

Ramsey Hurt

In that game, Rainier Outfielder Bill Ramsey, apparently confused because of all the heavy hitting, crashed into the center-field wall trying to catch a long one. He was hospitalized with a possibly broken left arm.

Seattle blanked the Angels, 1 to 0, in the finale off Walt Judnich's second homer of the day. Another oddity: Although winning the series—their seventh successive one—Seattle remains in seventh place in the standings.

Other scorings included San Francisco's double win over Portland, 9 to 5 and 6 to 4; Oakland and San Diego split with the Oaks, grabbing the opener, 8 to 5, and the Padres capturing a 7 to 0 shutout in the second game. Hollywood took a double win over Sacramento, 3 to 2 and 7 to 4.

15 Hits Insufficient

Although losing the opener, Portland clouted Al Lien and Con Dempsey for 15 hits, including home runs by Joe Brovia (his 18th), Eddie Basinski and Jim Gladd. Les Fleming increased his league runs-batted-in leadership to 77.

In the second contest, Dino Restelli and Joe Grace hit two home runs off Roy Helser and sent him to the showers. Grace extended his safe batting string to 12 games.

LaMotta Reluctantly Accepts Italian as Championship Foe

New York, June 19—(U.P.)—Reluctant Jake LaMotta was matched today for a defense of his world middleweight championship against No. 4 challenger, Tiberio Mitri, instead of against No. 9 contender, Rocky Graziano.

LaMotta, 29, has signed to meet Mitri of Italy, 23, at Madison Square garden on July 12 for 45 per cent of the net gate instead of meeting Graziano of Brooklyn at the Polo grounds

on June 28 for 30 per cent of the net receipts.

Long Negotiations

The international 15-round fight between Mitri of Trieste, Italy, and LaMotta of the Bronx was completed last night after more than 36 hours of negotiations that followed Graziano's withdrawal from the Polo grounds fight because of a fractured left thumb.

LaMotta, who hasn't defended the 160-pound crown since he wrestled it from the late Marcel Cerdan at Detroit last June, tried to use Graziano's injury as an excuse for additional delay in putting his crown on the line.

However, officials of the International Boxing club told him he must go through with the defense or they would "toss him to the wolves," which meant throw him into the laps of National Boxing association officials who have been trying to vacate his title.

Percentage Boosted

After much haggling, LaMotta agreed to accept the unbeaten young Italian as an opponent if he would get 15 per cent more of the net receipts than Graziano had been guaranteed.

Portland, Ore., June 19—(U.P.)—Youthful Dick Skeeters of Medford was hailed as the new all-around champion of the annual Oregon state trap shoot here today.

Skeeters, who won the state doubles crown Saturday, emerged from the four-day session with a total of 378 points out of a possible 400.

Cal Ray, nationally known gunner from Eugene, finished second in the all-around division with a 375 total. Third place went to C. L. Kendall, Oregon City, with a score of 374.

Mike Trautman was Central Point batting leader with four blows in six turns. Ken Trautman hit three times for the Millers. He cracked a second-inning homer with two men on base.

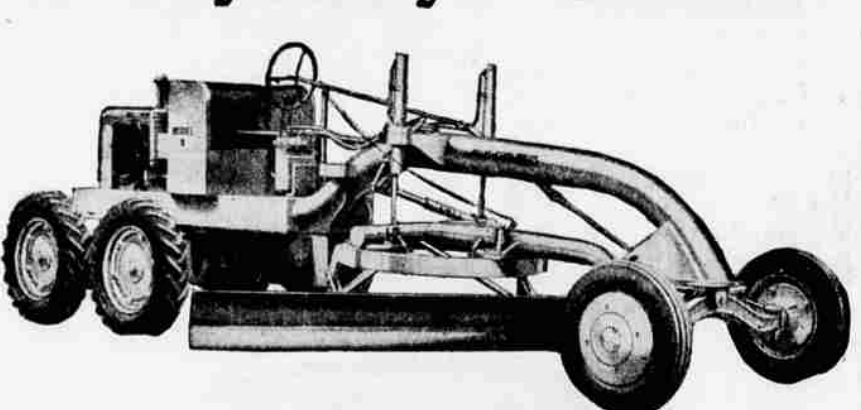
Don Sanford hurled for Central Point, keeping 10 hits well scattered and hitting three for six.
