SO YOUR HEART IS WEAK

I offer here some general conclusions of mine in reference to the heart. Remember, please, that I am just an ordinary family doctor turned newspaper quack merely because I couldn't make an honest living in private practice. I tried to prove G. Bernard Shaw had been wrong when he told a convention of doctors in London that the family doctor dare not tell patients the truth lest his patients change doctors. Shaw was right. So, after 18 years of country, city and hospital practice I hit upon this way of living without working.

The familiar complaint of "weak heart" is based on morbid fancy in most instances. The complaint is particularly questionable when it is the patient's chief complaint; that is, when the patient tells the doctor at the first interview that his or her weak heart is what brings him or her to the doctor.

As a general rule people with actual functional heart weaknesses or insufficiency seek medical advice for manifestations which they do not associate with the heart. This is not the place to suggest what manifestations or symptoms these may be, but I assure you it is so in everyday practice.

Palpitation, throbbing or forcible beating or rapid action of the heart which is felt by the patient, usually depends on emotional disturbance, excessive indulgence in alcohol, tobacco, tea, coffee or other cause than heart disease. Occasionally a patient with heart disease complains of palpitation, thought not as the chief or only complaint.

Speaking of coffee, it is my conviction that ordinary moderate use of good coffee (brewed as described in the red book What to Eat and Why—for a copy send 25 cents and stamped self-addressed envelope) is beneficial for adults with weak heart, heart disease or slow heart muscle failure or coronary thrombosis or angina pectoris. Caffeine, the active principle in coffee, in a cup of good coffee, gently stimulates the heart without after-depression as when other heart stimulants are used. Moreover, caffeine tends to relax or dilate the coronary arteries which feed fresh blood to the heart muscle and thus to prevent or relieve anoxia or oxygen-deficiency in the heart muscle.

So I advise people with any kind of heart trouble to continue to enjoy their morning coffee and another cup or two at dinner if they do not retire until four hours or longer after dinner, if they like.

Whether the patient's heart is really weak or not a heart tonic which, if it does no good at least can do no harm, may be just what the doctor should order. If

Fibroid Tumor

Answer—No. Many women have fibroid tumors and never suffer any ill effects.
Left Handedness
Baby, 13 months, seems to prefer to use her left hand. Husband insists we have had her hand, make her use the right. (Mrs. U. L.)

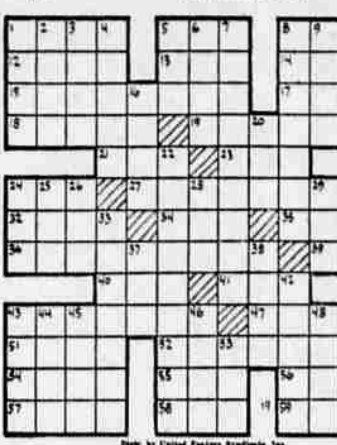
