

## Battle Colors Presented New Naval Reserve Unit; Activation Nearing

The battle colors of the aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge were presented to the new naval reserve organized electronics company here in simple ceremonies last night by Lt. Ted Pierce, Seattle, naval reserve procurement officer of the 13th naval district. The award was authorized to the unit's progress toward being the first in the Pacific northwest to be activated.

Nine men were sworn in as reservists. More than 60 men have previously indicated an interest in the program and the majority of these former navy personnel, assignment to the group will be completed by proper transfer of records, according to Lt. Henry Fisher, officer in charge of last night's meeting.

With the signing of the remainder of our minimum complement of 20 seamen at next Monday's meeting, the unit will be ready for immediate activation. Lt. Fisher said, "More than the required number have already expressed interest in the program and we are confident that final papers can be forwarded to Seattle next week."

It was announced that Lt. Edward O. Leonard, USNR, Medford, has been selected as commanding officer, under present tentative plans. Petty officers selected to direct training

courses include Don McClure, Medford, radioman first class; L. G. Youmans, Medford, radarman first class; Murray E. Woodward, Medford, electronic technician first class, and Warren W. Parke, Medford, sonarman first class.

Men who were sworn into the naval reserve last evening were Woodward, Christian F. Wieskamp, Medford, electrician mate second class; Luther E. Rhodes, Medford, seaman first class; Robert L. Larson and Roland L. Palmer, both Medford; John M. Clark and Robert H. Oden, both Ashland, and Charles W. Gilchrist and Martin O. Johnson, both Gold Hill, seaman recruits.

Lt. Pierce explained that the first week-end cruise from Crescent City is tentatively scheduled for late September and another voyage will be planned next May. Members of naval reserve units will embark on a destroyer escort for the two-day training sessions. Transportation and meals will be furnished.

Present in addition to the 40 men interested in the electronics program were Lt. Cmdr. Rodney Keating, commanding officer of the volunteer composite unit, and Lt. Cmdr. Lane Bardeen, commanding officer of the new naval reserve aviation unit.

## Chief Asks Burning Of Grass for Safety

Fire Chief Ed Canoose today requested residents with grass and weeds on their properties that are potential fire hazards to complete their burning this month while conditions are still favorable.

He said that good housekeeping out-of-doors as well as in-doors will prevent fires.

Persons with weeds, grass or rubbish to burn must call the fire department (2-2790) for fire permits. Canoose brought out that "running fires" to burn weed and grass grown vacant lots are prohibited. Weeds and grass must be cut and piled in a safe place for burning.

Nero did not fiddle while Rome burned. The violin was not invented until the 16th century.

The roast beef of old England is not as ancient as all that. Britons beat the armata on bacon and each other in the civil wars on stew.

The bride does not walk up the aisle. She walks up the nave. Cleopatra was Greek, not Egyptian.

The original Cinderella did not wear a glass slipper. It was fur and the mistake was made in translating from the French.

King John did not sign the Magna Carta. He could not read or write.

## German Rearming May Come But West So Far Undecided

Frankfurt, Germany—(U.P.)—The giant Krupp works and the I. G. Farben combine, backbone of the Nazi war machine, have had their war potential reduced to almost zero, allied sources declare.

If Germany were given the authority of the western powers to re-arm, as some militarists planning the defense of West Europe have recommended, she would have to start from scratch.

The Krupp munitions empire, centered in Essen, is a mass of rubble and steel skeletons, the result of war-time bombings and post-war dismantling.

Thousands of unemployed workers live in caves dug beneath the crumpled factories, bitter and disillusioned. Many of them openly pine for the "good old days" under Hitler.

**Krupp in Prison**—Alfred Krupp, heir to the empire, is a war criminal doing a 12 years' stretch in the Landsberg war crimes prison.

I. G. Farben, the chemicals, synthetic oils and explosives manufacturing combine which controlled 38 per cent of the world's chemical business before the war, has been cut up provisionally into small independent units by the allied decartelization branch.

I. G. Farben, physically, fared better than Krupps. Many of its plants were still standing when Germany collapsed. Krupp, if it ever gets on its feet again, will have to rebuild from the rubble.

According to a Krupp spokesman, only two Krupp plants are back in operation. They are a locomotive factory in Essen.

which is doing repair work, and a tungsten factory.

**Law Bars Return**—Krupp attorneys are fighting for the eventual return of the empire of the Krupp family, but the high commission law on reorganization of the steel industry appears to forestall that in these words:

"... The allied high commission has decided... it will not permit the return to positions of ownership and control of those persons who have been found to have furthered the aggressive designs of the National Socialist Party (the Nazis)."

Krupp produced only ten per cent of Germany's total steel production, but it was a key target of the bombers and the dismantlers because it specialized in armaments. Earlier Krupps

armed the Kaiser's army in the first world war.

I. G. Farben, the greatest economic concentration of all time, was spread throughout Germany. Sixty per cent of it was in the western zone and 40 per cent in the Russian zones at the end of the war.
