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YMCA Announces Completion of New Pottery Kiln

Medford YMCA today announced the start of operation of a new propane gas kiln of six cubic feet for baking pottery and ceramic ware.

Operator of the kiln is Arthur Brerton, who handles firing of all ceramic work at the "Y." He and his wife have voluntarily conducted classes at the "Y" for the past eight months. During the winter they operated a small electric kiln built by Brerton. The small size limited the volume of class work that could be turned out.

The new unit will make possible baking or glazing any work which might be brought to the "Y," according to General Secretary R. L. Jones. With closing of kilns at Central Point and Grants Pass, he said, there has been heavy demand for a place to fire ceramics. Several church Bible school groups are firing at the YMCA.

Girls who are "Y" members have a new class opening in ceramics on Mondays and Wednesdays at 9:30 a. m. Mrs. Earl D. Bruning and Mrs. J. J. Kennedy will be instructors. Bakery Operators Sue Striking Workers

Seattle, Wash., June 20—(U.P.) Seattle bakery operators filed a \$600,000-a-month damage suit against striking bakery workers today as bread supplies in Seattle dwindled to crumbs.

The action, filed in superior court, charged that local 9 of the Bakery and Confectionery Workers' union (AFL) breached a "no-strike" contract.

The Seattle Bakery bureau, comprising bakery operators in this area, asked \$600,000 for every month the strike was continued.
