Furgol Paces PGA Tourney Ohio Course

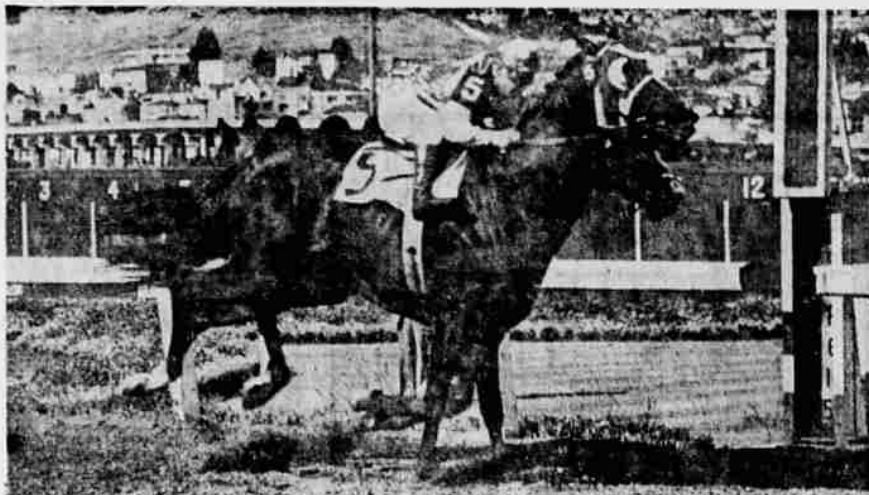
Columbus, O., June 22—(U.P.)—Marty Furgol of Albuquerque, N. M., went out after the qualifying medal in the 32nd PGA golf championship today, brimming with confidence in a new cross-handed putting grip he improvised halfway through the opening round.

Desperate over failure to knock down putts on the front nine Furgol switched to the new grip and he blazed home in 37-33-70 to tie Slugging Chick Harbert of Detroit for the lead after the first of two qualifying rounds. Harbert fired 35-35-70.

They were a shot ahead of Johnny Palmer of Badin, N. C., runnerup to Sam Snead last year; Dick Metz of Arkansas City, Kans.; Ellsworth Vines of Los Angeles and 51-year-old Al Watrous of Birmingham, Mich. The six leaders were the only pros to clip the par 72 at Scioto Country Club although record-breaking practice rounds earlier in the week indicated the scoring would be hot. Soft greens, marred by the foot-prints of the early starters among the 128 players shooting for the title, helped thwart their attack on par.

Brown Move Forecasted

St. Louis, Mo., June 22—(U.P.)—President Bill De Witt threatened today to move the St. Louis Browns out of St. Louis if the team doesn't start drawing more support at the box office, and Baltimore and Dallas immediately opened their arms to the club.

Mayor Thomas D'Alesandro of Baltimore wired De Witt that he would welcome the American league club "with open arms," and owner R. W. (Dick) Burnett of the Dallas Eagles said he was "very much interested" in buying the franchise.

De Witt revealed that he had received offers from Baltimore, Dallas, Los Angeles, Houston, Milwaukee and Kansas City, and he added flatly:

"It's a matter of self-preservation. If we don't get some support at the gate, we'll have to move."

PCC, Big Ten Talk 'Bowl'

Madison, Wis., June 22—(U.P.)—Final action on any renewal of the Big Ten-Pacific Coast Rose Bowl agreement probably will not come until May, 1951, spokesmen for both conferences indicated today after a one-day meeting to negotiate differences.

Commissioners Victor O. Schmidt of the Pacific Coast and Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson of the Big Ten said both committees would report back to the individual conferences in December.

Then another negotiating session would be held with the final vote by each conference slated for the May, 1951 meeting.

The committees from the two leagues discussed three phases of the contract at yesterday's meeting, allocation of tickets, method of selection of teams and restriction on practice periods.
