

Record-Smashing Pig Production Seen This Year

Washington, June 22—(U.P.)—The agricultural department today forecast production this year of a record-smashing peacetime crop of 99,079,000 pigs.

Officials said the report indicates a greater than usual seasonal drop in pork prices next fall and winter.

Three Per Cent Boost

It showed:
1. Farmers are fattening 60, 079,000 spring pigs for the fall and winter market. That's three per cent more than the previous peace time record-smasher which depressed prices last fall and winter.

2. A fall crop of 39 million pigs is in prospect. They will provide pork for the spring and

summer of 1951. The prospective crop is five per cent larger than last fall's crop which is now providing consumers with bacon and pork chops.

Largest in History

Both the spring and fall crops would be the largest in history except for the war years of 1942 and 1943 when a sizeable share of the nation's pork was diverted to military allies.

The fall crop forecast was based on a survey showing farmers plan to farrow five per cent more sows than last fall. In computing the pig forecast, litters of average size were assumed.

The department last December had predicted the 1950 spring crop would be six per cent larger than the previous year. Actually the department said, farmers farrowed five per cent more sows, but the number of pigs per litter was two per cent smaller than the previous year.

New Type Robot Uses Judgment In Computations

Washington, June 22—(U.P.)—The Bureau of Standards have unveiled a new type robot endowed with such "human" traits as judgment and initiative.

The Bureau of Standards Eastern Automatic Computer, or SEAC for short, is an entirely electronic device which can perform in seconds intricate com-

putations that would take human beings days or even months. Dr. Edward U. Condon, bureau director, told some 270 high military and civilian officials at dedication ceremonies yesterday that SEAC and its descendants "are bound to give a new dimension of freedom to mankind."

They will "free men's minds from dull and uninteresting routine, just as other machines have freed his muscles," he said.

SEAC was developed for the comptroller's office of the air force.

With lightning speed it can add, subtract, multiply, divide, compare, make logical transfers from one set of instructions to

another, and control the receipt, flow and output of information. It can solve problems in mathematics, physical science and engineering, actuarial science, economic analysis, agricultural experimentation and large scale management.
