From Moscow:
"A cheering, applauding supreme Soviet (parliament) voted unanimously last night to continue Premier Joseph Stalin's government in office."

INTERESTING?

Of course it's interesting. But it's not unusual. It would have been HIGHLY UNUSUAL if the members of the Russian supreme Soviet had voted to throw Uncle Joe out on his ear, for in that event they would have been voting to THROW THEMSELVES OUT ON THEIR EARS.

Politicians seldom do things like that.

THE members of the supreme Soviet (whose jobs, as Russian jobs go, are very, very, very cushy) then went on to endorse a couple of resolutions adopted recently at a "World's Peace Partisans congress" held in Stockholm. The resolutions demand:

1. Prohibition of atomic weapons.
2. Branding as war criminals officials of the first government to use atomic weapons.

After that they dusted off their hands and went on record

BUT you must have noticed that while Russia is preparing for war with every ounce of energy she possesses she is talking peace out of the other side of her mouth. While we prepare for hot war, all our diplomats are talking about THE COLD WAR WE ARE FIGHTING.

DID you ever hear of Pavlov's experiments in conditional reflexes?

It's a long story and it sounds like a dry subject, but this is the long and the short of it: Pavlov discovered that by ringing a certain bell at a certain time he could eventually make a dog's saliva and digestive juices flow EXACTLY AS IF HE HAD PLACED FOOD BEFORE THE DOG.

The dog, in time, came to associate the sound of the bell with the idea of food, which the dog WANTED very much.

SO WHAT?

Here's what:
I think the Russians are adopt-

ganda. They are ringing the peace bell. At every opportunity they accuse us of scheming for aggressive war.

They are hoping that in time they will condition people's reflexes so that when they hear the Russians talk they will THINK OF PEACE and when they hear us talk they will THINK OF WAR.

Since everybody wants peace (exactly as Pavlov's guinea-pig dogs wanted food) that will tend to turn the sympathies of millions upon millions of people toward Russia rather than toward us.

I'M AFRAID we're playing Russia's game. We talk constantly of the "cold war" we're fighting. We tell of the staggering weapons we're creating (bombs that will track down their target as a dog tracks down a rabbit, for example).

I think we ought to talk more about peace and less about war. We have to go on preparing for war, of course. But let's not talk so much about it. So far as war preparations are concerned, let's just saw wood and say nothing.

Jet Plane Defenders Said Here to Stay

Moses Lake, Wash., June 22.
(U.P.)—The jet plane defenders of the Pacific northwest are here to stay. But the sleek, menacing fighters do not stay very long in one place.

These 20th century marvels of air power are feature actors in the air force's "operation whipstock," a lightning-fast training exercise played high in the sky.

I flew with one of the young fighter pilots yesterday in a two-seat, jet transitional fighter, the T-33. Although the T-33's performance does not compare with our present first-line fighters, the F-86's, it is more than enough to convince one only familiar with the "old-fashioned," conventional engine interceptor that a new air age has arrived.

Zoomed Toward Sun

When a mock enemy bomber was picked up on the air command's radar screen, 1st Lt. Alexander L. Cochran and I strapped ourselves in a warmed-up fighter and charged down the 10,000-foot concrete runway for the interception.

We zoomed toward the sun to search for our quarry which was loafing along somewhere at 400 miles an hour.

Interceptions are made anywhere within a 200-mile radius of this sun-baked air field in a matter of minutes. With Jets and modern B-50 bombers streaking toward rendezvous points at combined speeds of more than 1,200 miles an hour, seconds are important.

The air force emphasized that operation whipstock is an exercise to train pilots, ground personnel and radar units in split-second cooperation and coordination. This, the air force said, is necessary to repel a possible enemy striking force.

Score Favors Defenders

Unofficially, the battle score has been overwhelmingly in favor of the jet defenders.

Flying with Lt. Cochran also was an elementary lesson in Pacific northwest geography. Above the 30,000-foot level our flying time from here to Spokane—120 miles—was less than 15 minutes.

Below, spread out in high relief, were Grand Coulee dam, Dry Falls, Lake Chelan and the winding Columbia river.

Jets have been operating from both the Moses Lake base, recently renamed Larsen Air Force base, and Paine field near Everett, Wash. Two full squadrons, the 81st from this desert
