

Rogues Climb into Fourth Place; Here Tonight, Saturday, Sunday

"We're on our way to first or second place," Manager Tommy Nelson of the Medford Rogues told the writer before last night's game and fans who journeyed out to the fairgrounds ball yard are not hard to convince that this may be so.

Last night the local club through the help of Don Williams' line single to right center scoring Russ Stuart and some nifty relief hurling by Veteran

Pete Jonas scored a 10-inning 7 to 6 victory over Willows. Stuart Starts Rally

Stuart had opened that 10th stanza with a ground single to center and after Chuck Freeman had filed out and Johnny Popovich grounded out, the latter sending Stuart to second base. Williams rapped a single to right center to score the Medford shortstop.

Jonas came into the game in

the seventh inning, allowed one hit and gave up no walks to receive credit for the win. Starting Pitcher Jack Gruell was shelved from the Medford mound during the Cards' uprising in the fifth while Bill Francis was yanked for a pinchhitter.

It was another night of good baseball for Rogues' fans with the victory boosting Medford into fourth place.

Stuart and Jack Cooney com-

bined on a nice bit of fielding in the ninth with Cooney digging a low throw out of the dirt after Stuart backhanded a grounder at deep short.

Gruell Shows Form

Gruell showed good form in picking a Willows player off first base in the first stanza, Lloyd Jones went into deep second base position to throw out a player in the eighth and the local club pulled off a double play the hard way—first to short to first.

Medford picked up a single run in right and scored as two out Popovich doubled off the fence in right and scored as Marc Guglielmo lined a single off the shortstop's glove.

Two more scored for the Rogues in the second as Cooney singled to right center, Gruell reached on a fielder's choice, Stuart beat out a bunt, Popovich singled to left and Guglielmo flied to right center.

Popovich Gets Double

In the fourth with one out Stuart reached first on an error, stole second and scored as Popovich doubled to left center.

Medford's fifth tally in the sixth came when out out Freeman and Popovich walked and Guglielmo lined a single into left centerfield.

The Rogues' tying ruin the sixth stanza was manufactured on Jones' single, a wild pitch, Cooney's single and an error.
