Sears Roebuck and Medford

Mayor Diamond Flynn's report to the city council Tuesday night concerning his recent interview with a Sears Roebuck official should serve to clear the atmosphere regarding the company's plans for the site on South Riverside avenue.

THE land was purchased some time ago for the announced purpose of constructing a large store and a number of dwellings were removed soon after the lots were acquired. Although it appeared at that time that construction would start immediately, nothing has since been done.

THE official informed Mayor Flynn that his company has no immediate plans for construction and he also stated that rumors that Sears Roebuck has been seeking a highway site between this city and Talent are completely without foundation.

JUST what caused the big merchandising concern to change its plans regarding a Medford installation has never been completely explained. It is understood, however, that the company's expansion program was altered somewhat immediately after the war to provide for concentration on larger centers of population.

It is also understood that as money becomes available for future store building the installation of a large branch here, probably including a retail facility and a distribution center for mail orders, will be undertaken.—E.C.F.

Keeping Business Downtown

(Albany Democrat-Herald)

Both at Salem and Corvallis sizable apartment house construction projects have been launched, the latest being a 6-story 48-unit structure at Corvallis. These are in addition to extensive apartment accommodations in the downtown areas of the two towns.

ALBANY is sorely in need of such housing, and local downtown business interests overlooked a bet when they failed to insure permanence of downtown customers while construction costs were low. As a result residential units are being scattered all over the landscape and downtown business establishments are losing much patronage that they might have assured for themselves had they awakened to the danger which was obvious when the new highway was built through town.

AN APARTMENT house such as that projected at Corvallis can house from 100 to 130 persons. Two or three such buildings downtown would be a distinct asset to the central trading area, for few urban apartment occupants would go to the outskirts to do their trading. Business created by purchases made for 300 or more persons would make a marked difference in business volume in the vicinity of these housing units when added to that already afforded by downtown residents, and the apartments would forever serve as an anchor to the Albany business district which it must be admitted shows some signs of deteriorating in favor of suburban shopping centers.

As to the demand for apartments, one can hardly doubt when one surveys the miserable living quarters for which occupants are now paying from \$25 to \$50 a month.

THE business interests of the town have it within their power to save themselves. There has been too much procrastination, it is true, but more business will be available and it is not too late to capture it as it comes. All that is necessary is foresight and action to back it.

The Dalles, Ore., June 23.—(UP)—Sixty men were recruited here last night to move 85 carloads of beans owned by the commodity credit corporation from docks on the Columbia river following reports that the river would rise higher than predicted.

Dolph Kinsey, manager of the port of The Dalles, said the beans would be moved anywhere they could find room at high levels. He reported the river level at the docks was 47.5 feet last night and it would have to reach 50.7 feet before the docks were flooded.

From Washington:

"Leon H. Keyserling, chairman of President Truman's council of economic advisers, says the nation is 'at the peak point of post-war real prosperity' and the outlook for the rest of the year is good."

IF that is true (and I certainly hope it is) we ought to be paying off our national debt instead of increasing the mortgage on the house to pay our grocery bills. Any business man knows that if you keep adding to your debt when times are good, instead of paying off on it, you're in for bad times when times aren't so good.

PLEASE don't get me wrong. I know we're not going to cut down on our spending and start retiring our debt THIS YEAR. This is an election year, and everybody running for office thinks the way to get elected is to SPEND. I'm just so hopelessly behind the times as to think that if you keep on spending more than you take in the time will come when you will wish you hadn't.

THIS one is from South Carolina:

"Federal retirement pay drawn by former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes was injected into the South Carolina governor's race yesterday."

"Lester L. Bates, one of Byrnes' three opponents for the governorship in the Democratic primary, declared that Byrnes draws \$8,637.08 a year in a federal pension. Bates said the money, no doubt, is deserved and is being put to good use. 'But,' he added, 'the regrettable thing is that all our people can not be provided for in the same proportion as the politicians provide for themselves.'"

THAT's a crack at the fact that under the federal retirement pay system our politicians are pretty well provided for when they "retire"—which means when they get defeated for re-election, for no politician ever retires for any other reason.

In fairness, it ought to be added that they put up a fair-sized chunk of the money themselves by deductions from their salaries while they are still in office.

THIS week's big political news is the statement by Ohio's democratic governor, Frank J.

Lausche that he hasn't made up his mind yet whether he will vote for Ohio's incumbent Senator Taft in November or for Taft's Democratic opponent for the senatorship.

That, by any accepted political standard, is HERESY, and since Taft is a national figure Democrats all over the country are wondering what the heck this guy Lausche is up to.

WELL, he MIGHT be as completely sincere as to believe that Taft is the best man for the state of Ohio and for the nation.

The political slant on the incident, however, seems to be that Lausche has decided that Taft is going to be overwhelmingly re-elected and he might as well make political medicine for himself by climbing on Taft's bandwagon NOW.
