

Theater Usherette Spurs Hope of Wilson Brothers

Vancouver, Wash., June 23—(U.P.)—Hopes of Turman and Utah Wilson for acquittal on charges of the kidnap-murder of JoAnn Dewey were spurred late yesterday when a theater usherette took the stand and almost provided them with an alibi.

However, Mrs. Cleo Wilson (no relation to the accused brothers) was unable to remember the exact night in March that she conversed with them. Their attorney, Irvin Goodman, said they were attending a movie in Portland when the abduction took place March 19.

Mrs. Wilson said she remembered Turman Wilson, 24, because he "looked so young to have a bald spot." She said he and Utah, 20, asked her about another usherette who had worked there before.

Earlier in the afternoon session, Prosecutor De Witt Jones said an expert would compare hair from the heads of the Wilsons' sister and sister-in-law with three strands found in the trunk of the Wilson car.

Dr. Howard L. Richardson, Oregon state police crime lab-

oratory head, testified last week that hair found in the coupe's trunk was "similar" to that of the murder victim. Richardson will conduct further research to determine whether it might be hair from one of the Wilson women.

Child Testifies

One defense witness was 10-year-old Naomi Goodman (no relation to Attorney Goodman). Under cross examination by Jones, she said the Wilsons' father, Bill Wilson who lives on her mother's property at Silverton, Ore., told her to say she saw the brothers return there late the night of the abduction.

Mrs. Stacy Goodman, the girl's mother, returned to the stand yesterday, and repeated that Turman and Utah visited their father at his trailer home the afternoon of March 19, leaving at about 7:45.

JoAnn Dewey was abducted from the streets of Vancouver March 19. Her battered body was found in the Wind river, north of here, March 26. Turman and Utah Wilson were arrested at Sacramento March 30.

No Progress Made In Bakery Strike

Portland, Ore., June 23—(U.P.) Striking AFL bakers reported late yesterday that no progress had been made in negotiations with local wholesale bakeries.

The 400-odd union members reaffirmed their demands for a five-day week, 20-cents-an-hour night differentials, time-and-a-half pay for Sunday, sick leave and other benefits.

The union's negotiating committee was instructed to meet again with the bakery employers' council when called by the federal mediation service.

Retail bakeries and some in eastern Washington and Oregon not affected by the strike, were supplying some bread but the demand for home baking products in grocery stores continued.
