John H. Rolston, 73, a resident of Medford for 40 years, passed away at the family residence, 101 Vancouver avenue, Friday. Mr. Rolston was born at Walkerton Ontario, Canada on Jan. 5, 1877.

He was employed by the Pacific Telephone company for 45 years, and retired on Nov. 1, 1942. Most of that time he was with the company in Medford.

He was a member of Medford Masonic Lodge No. 103, Malta commandery No. 4 Knights Templar, including eminent commander in 1939. Crater Lake chapter No. 32 Royal Arch, the council and Hillah temple of the Shrine. "Jack" as he was known to many friends, was captain of Hillah temple wrecking crew for many years, making most of the stunts that were used in initiation himself in his basement. He was a member of the Medford Elks Lodge 1168 also.

Mr. Rolston is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ida C. Rolston, two brothers, David and Charles Rolston of Vancouver, B. C., one sister, Elizabeth Rolston, San Gabriel, Cal.
