Local Youth Enters Naval Academy Monday

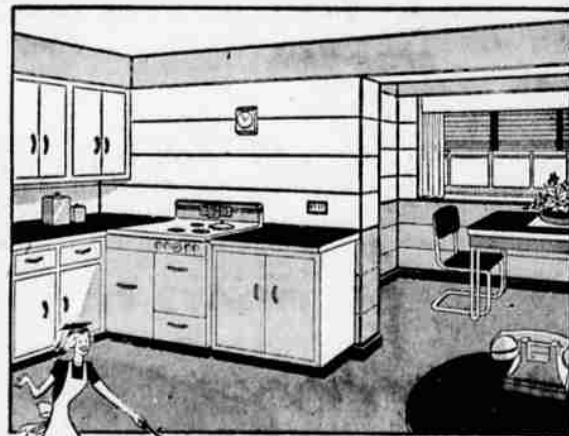
