BEWARE OF SALTS FOR HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

On entering private practice I served five years at hard labor in the country—Penn Yan, N. Y., now a beautiful village of perhaps 5000 population at the right Y-arm of Keuka lake, the gem of the famous Finger lakes of western New York state. Those five years were the hardest of my life—and the happiest. Although we nearly starved, Mickey and I and the baby—and probably would have done so but for the patience of the grocer, butcher and other merchants who extended us indefinite credit—I learned more about patients as people than I ever learned in hospital or city practice. It has been my firm belief ever since those halcyon days that a doctor should be permitted to hold himself out as a specialist only after he has served ten years in general practice, at least half of the time in a community of less than 10,000 population. Some such reasonable preparation would make medical specialization considerably less ridiculous than the racket is today, I think. Forty thousand "specialists" among a grand total of about 120,000 practicing physicians! Isn't that ridiculous?

High blood pressure had not become popular in my Penn Yan days. I doubt that more than two of the ten doctors in the village even brandished sphygmomanometers (gadgets for measuring blood pressure) and I know I was not one of them. Only the dozen or two of rich retired farmers who had travelled extensively to the best advertised clinic away out west even knew how to run off the yankety-yak about their high blood pressure. The best the ordinary yokels could do was to worry about their thick blood or too rich blood—

and dose themselves with prodigious quantities of salts, which, being yokels, they believed would "thin the blood"—a half-baked notion which is equivalent to lowering blood pressure in the mind of the person who acquires his knowledge from reading almanacs, nostrums and quick ads and testimonials from other yokels.

Far from lowering high blood pressure in any case, the effect of laxative or purgative salts of any kind is rather increase of excessive blood pressure.

Far from thinning the blood (even if the blood in any circumstance were too thick), the taking of salts or the use of laxative (aperient) mineral waters has a no appreciable effect on blood pressure today or this week, but frequent or habitual use of such salts tends to aggravate conditions which produce high blood pressure and impair general health by interfering with the assimilation of needed calcium from food.

As I have said here many times, high blood pressure, whether you guess you have it or some charlatan has applied his \$18.75 gadget to your arm and told you just how many points above par your pressure reaches, is not a disease susceptible of treatment by itself. In order to be of any real benefit to the patient with high blood pressure treatment must combat or correct whatever condition may cause the blood pressure to rise above normal. Would you monkey around with diet, medicine or any kind of treatment for rapid pulse or high body temperature without medical examination to find out if possible what ails you?

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Self-Mutilation
Several years ago I had a tattoo of an area of my skin, which I now regret. Is there any way to remove this mutilation? (J. O.)
Answer—Perhaps by dissection and filling the defect with graft from normal skin. Sometimes the mutilation may be made less conspicuous by careful chemical tattooing or color tattooing to obliterate the picture. It should be a penal offense to tattoo or permit tattooing, except for legitimate purpose.

Exposed to Cold
I am 70, healthy, stand in cold ice box at work several hours a day. No ill effect. But at night I often wake up with cramps in the legs or feet. (N. C.)
Answer—Send stamped self-addressed envelope and ask for pamphlet **ADULT TETANY AND GROWING PAINS**. Your work has nothing to do with it, but your faulty nutrition probably accounts for the tetany.

Like Tea
I like to keep a tea bag in my mouth never break the bag but after a while I put it in hot water to make tea to drink. (Mrs. S. W.)

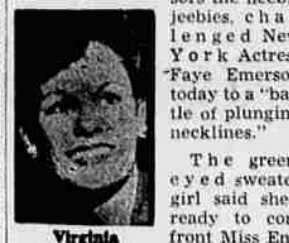
