

Rogues, Peaches to Play Twin Bill Here Tonight, One Game Monday

Professional baseball will be a big item in the local sports picture today and Monday when the Medford Rogues tackle the Marysville Peaches in a twin bill at 6:30 tonight and in a single game tomorrow at 7:45 at the fairgrounds ball park.

The scheduled game between the two teams last Friday night was postponed because of rain and cold.

Manager Tommy Nelson of the Rogues said that Bill Francis and Bob Smith, both lefthanders, probably would hurl tonight's Far West league games. Should the Peaches use too many lefthanded batters, the Medford club may use a righthanded pitcher, however.

Monday Hurler Unnamed

The local player-manager did not indicate who would hurl for the Rogues on Monday evening. Nelson also indicated that he may remove himself from the active player list soon to make room for another veteran hurler for the Rogues.

He has been bothered for several weeks now by injuries to both ankles which cause him to limp and have kept him out of the lineup. Should he go onto the inactive list, however, he could still manage from the bench but would not play any.

Rogues in Fourth

The Rogues are in fourth place this morning by at least a half game after Redding defeated fifth-place Reno in the only Far West game played Friday night.

An article in the Marysville Appeal-Democrat last week indicated the Peaches are having financial troubles and that Roseburg, Ore., has asked the league to transfer the franchise of the Peaches to that city.

Leave on Tuesday

Neither league nor Roseburg baseball officials could be contacted for comment Saturday evening.

After Monday night's game the Rogues leave for Willows, Cal., where they open a three game series and then go on to Marysville for four games before returning to Medford July 4 for a doubleheader against Reno.

Rogues Hitting, Fielding

Medford's Rogues continued to lead the Far West league in fielding with a .948 mark or .003 ahead of Pittsburgh and .005 ahead of third place Klamath Falls, according to latest official averages.

The local club as a team was batting .269 to rank sixth in the league with Klamath leading the hitting race at a .309 percentage followed by Redding with .290.

DiMaggio Top Hitter

Vince DiMaggio of Pittsburgh paced the league hitters with a .399 average, followed by Chet Ashman (Klamath) with .394, Rosburg (Redding) .389, Billy Enos (Pittsburgh) .380 and Manager Joe Borich of Reno with .377.

Johnny Popovich led the Rogues' regulars as of Monday, June 19, with a .315 average but

only two of the Medford regular players were batting .300 or over as of that date. The other regular was Don Williams with .308.

Jack Lloyd was leading the Medford pitching corps as of that date with six wins and three defeats, followed by Carl Huebner with three victories and two losses, Lloyd Jones had six and five and LaVerre Herrmann with five and nine.

Hatridge of Redding led the league with eight wins and one defeat, while Freeze (Willows) had seven and one, Sierra (Klamath) nine and two and Agular (Marysville) and Scott (Redding) each with six and two.

Herrmann was among the league's hurling leaders with 104 innings pitched.

Three games in the Far West Baseball league were rained out Friday night and Redding took the only completed contest 13 to 5 over Reno.

Pittsburgh at Klamath Falls was called after the fourth inning due to rain. Pittsburgh was ahead 5 to 0.

Willows at Eugene and Marysville at Medford were the other postponed games.

Redding placed itself more firmly in the league lead as Silver Sox Pitcher Marcus Torres lost control in the sixth inning.

Until that time Redding was ahead by one run, a homer off the bat of left fielder Tom Lucido. Then in the sixth, Torres led three runs come home in a succession of singles, walks and one wild pitch. He was pulled in favor of Manuel Luna, who lost three more scores before the inning was over.

Ray Perry hit his 23rd home run of the year for Redding.

Baseball Class Opens Monday

Summer baseball activities for Medford boys will get underway Monday morning at the senior high field when 75 to 100 boys are expected to turn out for the first day.

This annual Summer Baseball school consisting of fundamentals of the sport as well as playing the game, will be in charge of Alex McDonald once again. He will be assisted this year by Frank Roelandt and Bob Newland of the high school coaching staff.

Youth Age Reported

Boys eight to 16 years of age will have school sessions Monday through Thursdays from 8 a.m. to noon and in the afternoons from 1 to 3 o'clock on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Ball games will be played Tuesdays and Thursdays in the afternoon, McDonald said.

In past years the local professional baseball club in the Far West league has sent several of its players and manager to the school on many occasions and the Medford Rogues of this season plan to do the same.

Rogues Volunteer Aid

Player Manager Tommy Nelson of the Rogues said that he and one or two other players will go to the school sessions when ever the staff would like and when the club is in town.

Addition of Pete Jones, Pacific university baseball coach, to the Rogues' mound crew, may mean he will help.

This baseball school and games is about the only organized form of recreation available to boys in Medford except for the Hawthorne park swimming pool and playground.

Plans call for the school to last about eight weeks with morning sessions devoted to baseball fundamentals and two of the afternoons to games. Already two teams of local youths have joined the Pee Wee league organized among towns and cities in this area.

No Charge Made

There is no charge to attend the local baseball school.

Boys should bring their own gloves or mitts and if they have spiked shoes the youths should wear them. However the shoes are not necessary items. Sessions tomorrow will open about 9 a.m. and will continue until noon.
