

Hi Hurdles Mark Broken In AAU Meet

College Park, Md., June 24—(U.P.)—Dick Attlesley, a rangy, bronzed member of the Los Angeles Athletic club, toppled the world record for the 110 meter high hurdles today when he won the national AAU championship in 13.6 seconds.

Attlesley blazed through the 95 degree heat over the sticks to lower the old mark of 13.7 set by Forrest Towns in 1936 and matched by Fred Wolcott in 1941.

Craig Dixon, Attlesley's teammate and defending high hurdles titlist, was eliminated in the trials while hobbled with a bad leg.

While Attlesley was setting a world record and meet mark, one other senior meet record was shattered by Sam Felton of the New York A. C. and Jim Fuchs, the Yale powerhouse also representing the Gotham musclemen, tied the shot record.

Felton heaved the 16 pound hammer 187 feet 3 3/4 inches to end the 36-year reign of P. T. Ryan, who set a perennial hammer toss mark of 183 feet 3 3/4 inches back in 1914.

Singles and doubles matches between men tennis players from Medford and Klamath Falls will be held starting at 10:30 a.m. today on the senior high courts.

Hart, Bromwich Best in Tennis

London, June 24 — (U.P.) — Giant-killer Doris Hart of Jacksonville, Fla., beat American champion Margaret Osborne DuPont of Bellevue, Del., 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, and Jack Bromwich of Australia came from behind twice to down Art Larsen of San Francisco, 6-2, 6-4, today in the finals of the London grass court tennis championships.

This tournament is the final warmup for the classic Wimbledon, which begins Monday, and Miss Hart's victory vaulted her to the fore as a possible winner of that competition at long last. Twice she has been in the finals, and twice defeated—by Mrs. DuPont in 1947 and by Louise Brough in 1948.

Larsen emerged from the London tournament semifinals as the U. S. white hope after a resurgence of old-time Australian net power. But today he blew 2-1 leads in both sets to tumble to Bromwich's versatile onslaught.

Noor Easily Defeats Citation, California

Albany, Cal., June 24 — (U.P.) The Irish-bred Noor whipped Citation for the fourth straight time today as he set a new world record in winning the \$50,000 Golden Gate handicap.

The brilliant stretch-runner, owned by Mrs. C. S. Howard, ran the mile and one quarter in 1:58 1/5 to cut one and three fifths seconds off the old mark. The margin of victory was three lengths with Citation second, one length ahead of On Trust.

There were only five horses in the race, with Esprit de France fourth and Stepfather last.

Noor Pays \$3.40

Only win wagering was allowed and Noor, who went to the post as a 3-5 favorite, paid \$3.40 on each \$2 mutual ticket. It was the first time since Citation was a two year old that he was not favored to win.

The veteran Johnny Longden gave Noor a terrific ride. He held the big Irish son of Nas-

rullah in check for nearly a mile.

During that time On Trust went to the front and at the halfway mark was nearly ten lengths in front of the field, with Stepfather second, three lengths ahead of Esprit de France, who was trailed by Citation and Noor.

At the three-quarter mark it looked as if On Trust's margin was too large for Noor or Citation to make up.

Then Longden turned Noor loose and he and Citation ran neck and neck to the head of the stretch. It was then that Noor showed the championship caliber as he pulled away from Citation and On Trust to win with yards to spare.

The victory was worth \$32,950 to Noor and brought his all-time earnings to \$205,690. Citation, the all-time money-winning champion, picked up \$12,000 for second place and now has \$938,630 to his credit.

Mangrum, Palmer Lead Eight into Quarterfinal

Columbus, O., June 24 — (U.P.) Lean Lloyd Mangrum and Pudgy Johnny Palmer led eight survivors into the quarterfinals of the PGA golf championship today as Eddie Burke, the mufin-faced little man who dethroned Sam Snead, finally met

his own watery Waterloo.

Mangrum despite heavy thunderstorms, fired the hottest golf of the tournament as he mowed down Detroit's Chick Harbert, 6 and 5, to lead Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., Ray Gafford of Ft. Worth, Tex., and Chandler Harper of Portsmouth, Va., into the upper bracket quarter finals, after today's 36-hole third round.

Palmer, runner-up to Snead last year, matched Mangrum's morning 66 — a competitive course record—but cooled off a bit in the afternoon round as he rambled past Ted Kroll of New Hartford, N. Y., 1 up. That put the tough little man from Badin, N. C., into the lower bracket quarters.

Meanwhile, Demaret was roaring back through the rain to knock off Denny Shute of Akron, O., 2 up; Harper kayoed tiny Bob Toski of Northampton, Mass., 2 and 1; Williams conquered Claude Harmon of Mamaroneck, N. Y., 1 up in 38; Douglas grounded airlines pilot Elmer Reed of Atlanta, 3 and 2; and Picard eliminated Jackson Bradley of St. Charles, Ill., 1 up.

In tomorrow's 36-hole quarter-final matches, Mangrum meets Harper and Demaret plays Gafford in the upper half of the draw. Douglas faces Williams in the lower half while Palmer tackles Picard.

The Boosters were largely responsible for bringing the swimmers from Portland who helped dedicate the Hawthorne park pool, promoted opening night of the Medford Rogues and will present pins to graduating members of the 1950 high school track squad.

Trout Eggs Taken At Diamond Lake

Over 4,000,000 trout eggs have been obtained from wild rainbow by Oregon state game commission spawning crews. The last of four spring egg-take operations are now being completed at Diamond, East and Paulina lakes.

Diamond lake spawners have produced nearly 2,000,000 eggs. The fish are trapped as they enter tributary streams and the lake outlet, Lake creek. The spawned-out fish are returned to the lake.

At East and Paulina lakes, spawning rainbow striped from shoal areas have been stripped of 370,000 eggs. A Sno-Cat was used to transport the crews and their supplies into the lakes in mid-May.

The spring egg-take of wild rainbow trout supplies only a part of the trout hatchery demands. Fall-spawning rainbow, a hatchery developed strain of trout, provide many million eggs from brood stock held at the hatcheries.

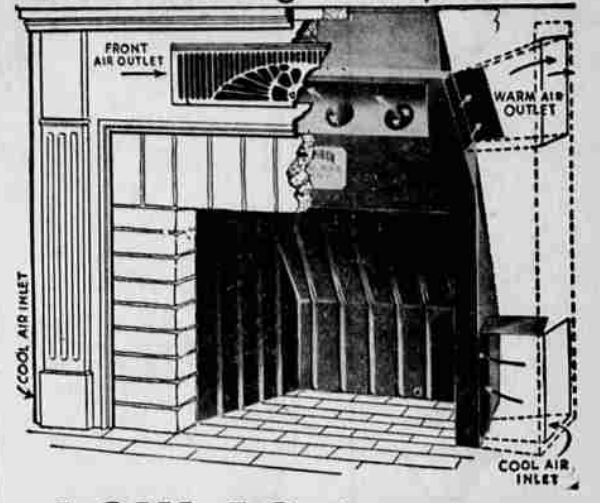
Two homers, one a grand slam by John Bertoglio, the other a three-run clout by Jep Holmes featured the hitting Friday night in the Sunset Baseball league.
