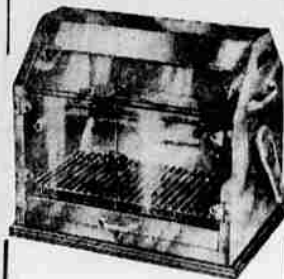


Mounted Troop, Posse To Hold Final Drill
