Harlelee Wilson, well known valley violinist and music teacher, has been accepted by the faculty of the Berkshire Music Festival of Tanglewood, Mass., and will study this season at the widely known summer music school. Mr. Wilson has left for the east and will be absent about two months.

At the school he will have an opportunity to study under and observe the famous orchestra conductor, Serge Koussevitzky, who founded the school and has conducted the annual concerts given by the musicians who gather at Tanglewood each summer for study.

Many Weddings Held This Month Rites Set Friday

June has brought many weddings, a fact which will surprise no one, but June weddings, like the weather, are always good for both news and conversation.

Among late June brides will be Miss Audree Andrews, whose wedding to Roger Note of Shady Cove has been set for June 30 at St. Mark's Episcopal church. The bride-to-be is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Andrews and Mr. Note is a son of Mrs. Rex Note and the late Mr. Note of Shady Cove.

Tradition dictates that the bride must wear "something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue." In fulfilling these traditions, Beverly Daily, on the day of her wedding to Edwin Clark, carried her great-grandmother's silk handkerchief, first used by the great-grandmother on her wedding day, and wore a pair of stockings 102 years old.

The stockings were loaned by Mrs. Charity Sander of Medford and were of fine mercerized cotton in a lacy design known in that day as "couching." They were first worn by Mary Meyer when she married Michael Heckert in Missouri in April of 1848, and for the second time were worn by Charity Richie when she became the bride of Fred C. Sander in Goldfield, Nev., Nov. 20, 1906, the bride being a granddaughter of Mary Meyer Heckert. Later they were worn by Lorna Richie, great-granddaughter of Mrs. Heckert, when Lorna married James Roderick Manning in August of 1947 at Rialto, Cal.

The old stockings seemed particularly appropriate for Miss Daily to wear, for the petite bride looked quaint in her size 10 wedding dress with an old-fashioned ruffle around the bottom of the skirt. The stockings, which were knee-length, were held by blue garters which served for the bride's "something blue."

When it came time for the bride and bridegroom to cut the first slice of wedding cake, they used a silver knife at one time belonging to the last queen of the Hawaiian islands, Queen Liliuokalani, and now the property of Frank C. Clark, Medford architect and father of the bridegroom. Remainder of the cake was cut with an heirloom knife belonging to Mrs. W. J. Warner which has been used for dozens of valley weddings during the past 50 years.

Brides have one thing in common—most of them are in such a tizzy the last few days they forget important little tasks. When the former Dara Turner, who was married to James McDonald June 11, went on her honeymoon she found she had forgotten to complete her packing and was forced to do some hasty shopping.

A similar story was told by the Fred Carters, parents of the well known west coast concert pianist and radio artist, Paulena Carter, who was married the same day in Los Angeles to Jack Wormser, television show producer.

This bride was quite sure she had everything under control only to find when she went to change from wedding dress to traveling clothes that she had neglected to bring her suit to the chapel dressing room. While reception guests ate wedding cake and drank punch, the Carters had to hurry home and bring back the suit.

The lovely Paulena is often heard by valley music lovers who listen to the Standard Hour and she is scheduled to play again when the famous conductor, Arthur Fiedler, is guest star. Her parents were in the valley briefly last week to visit relatives.

The former Elizabeth Deaver, who married in Portland, almost had a wedding without a wedding cake. Because of the bakers' strike in Portland, the shop where the cake had been ordered was forced to cancel and Tuesday afternoon found Miss Deaver frantically hurrying from shop to shop trying to find someone who would bake a wedding cake. At the last moment she found a small shop where a kind-hearted baker saved af-
