Animal Disease Control Of Interest to All

Animal disease control should be of interest to every person in Jackson County. The farmer or stock raiser is interested from a financial point of view, and the owner and non-producer is interested from a health standpoint. Many health problems may be closely associated with animal diseases. Undulant fever, tuberculosis, anthrax and Rocky Mountain spotted fever are only a few examples of human ills associated with animal diseases. Improved livestock management programs that will tend to reduce animal diseases are necessary in order to receive maximum benefits from health programs. All rural as well as urban people will benefit from co-ordinated programs.

A county livestock disease control committee was recently appointed for the principal purpose of suggesting ways and means of reducing the heavy animal loss to producers. This committee has no enforcement or police powers. It is charged with the responsibility of considering the various problems and to suggest programs that may improve local conditions. The personnel of the committee consists of: Dr. H. P. Poston, chairman; James Miller Jr., Ben Nelson, R. L. Went, Charles H. Elmore and W. B. Tucker, secretary.

Any program involving large numbers of individual voluntary participation must be preceded by justifiable reasoning if results are to be secured. How may the producer gain by accepting and putting into practice a program time or more expenditure of that will involve either more funds? This committee will undertake to do this by first securing the best information available, and second to suggest procedure so that all interested parties may profit directly or indirectly by cooperating in the program. One example may be given: Brucellosis is a serious disease of animals that directly affects humans. The bovine type is prevalent in dairy as well as beef cattle. Eradication of the disease is desired by all concerned.

Most producers agree that calfhood vaccination, plus test and slaughter, plus sanitation is an effective method of eradication. The county government is co-operating by providing free testing services. Producers are benefitted by increased calf crops, more rapid gain in beef cattle and greater production in dairy cattle. Consumers are afforded greater protection against undulant fever. Other suggestions will be proposed as programs are developed.

Winter Garden Planting Time Now at Hand

Winter garden planting time is now with us. A winter garden is one which is planted in the summer and harvested during the winter. Every year we have a number of calls along in August by people wanting to plant out a winter garden patch. There is very little that can be planted in August, so if you are interested in a winter garden, now would be the time to get out and plant it. While you have up until early July to do your planting, it would be best to take advantage of any spell of cool weather that we may have. Cool weather planting makes it much easier to get seeds to germinate and there will be less shock to those plants which are transplanted.

Cabbage, broccoli, kale, cauliflower and celery are crops which should be set out as plants. If seed of these are sown now they will come too late to make a crop this winter. It requires about two dozen of any of these plants to supply an average family. When setting these plants out it would be very desirable to water them with a little booster solution made up by using a tablespoon of ammonium sulfate or four tablespoons of a complete fertilizer in a gallon of water. Then if the weather is warm, it would be desirable to shade the plants for a few days. This can be done either by shading each individual plant with a shingle, or a one-by-six board can be placed on edge along the south or the west side of the row and that will shade the plants sufficiently to protect them.

Beets, rutabagas, carrots and swiss chard can be seeded now, and in another couple of weeks some fall lettuce could be sown. The lettuce and swiss chard will come on and produce fall crops and then will be destroyed by winter. If the winter is not too severe, the swiss chard will come back again in the spring and produce an early crop of greens. The root crops will be grown by fall and can then be

From Washington:
"Administration forces opened a drive for senate approval of a program which would place America's most modern weapons—except atomic bombs—ALONG THE DEFENSE FRONTIERS OF WESTERN EUROPE."

Two senate committees strongly emphasized that new-type weapons developed since World War II would go into Europe's defenses. "These new weapons of defense," the report said, give us greater assurance that our plans can be carried out successfully without the necessity of matching the enemy division for division, tank for tank or man for man."

THE committees' report speaks of recoilless guns, shaped explosives for use against tanks, non-magnetic mines and new uses of vacuum tube fuses. Then it adds:

"MANY OF THESE ARMS ARE NOT BEING PRODUCED IN ANY NUMBER."

MORE from Washington:

"Americans spent less on liquor in 1949 than in any year since 1944, the commerce department reported today. It was the second straight year in which they cut down on their alcoholic intake."

W. E. Maness, traveling passenger agent, Portland, accompanied the train from Grants Pass to Dunsmuir. Thomas J. McCarry, traveling freight and passenger agent, Roseburg, was in charge of the initial northbound run.
