Republican Women's Luncheon, Show Attracts Many Visitors, Officials

The Gay Nineties style show and luncheon given by Jackson County Republican Women Friday at the Rogue Valley Country club brought many rounds of applause from the more than 200 women who attended. The old gowns were beautiful and models most attractive, the background music was well done, entrees for the hat contest were amusing and the speeches were pointed and brief, all this adding up to an entertaining afternoon.

Mrs. M. Allison Moulton introduced Mrs. Marshal Cornett, Klamath Falls, national republican committee woman who brought greetings from Gov. Douglas McKay; Sigfrid Unander, Portland, state chairman of the republican party and Mrs. Unander; Mrs. H. D. Peterson, The Dalles, state vice-chairman of the party; Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, Portland, president of the Oregon Council of Republican Women.

Prizes in the hat contest went to Mrs. George Carter, most authentic Gay Nineties hat; Mrs. George Johnson, most original and Mrs. A. J. Loeffler, best political hat. Judges were Mr. Unander, Mayor Diamond Flynn, Col. Ben Stafford, John Niedermyer, former county republican chairman and Don Lane, secretary of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Carter's hat was an enormous straw with large plumes. Mrs. Johnson wore a creation made by her husband, radio engineer, who used two records, several radio tubes, a replica of a radio station and a foot-high station tower for the amazing headgear. The little station lighted up from time to time.

Mrs. Loeffler's prize winning hat was a turban topped with three little skunk figurines and a sign which read "What Smells? Democrats!"

While not entered in the contest, Mrs. Moulton's hat caused practically a sensation. She wore a large platform holding a doll-sized table and four chairs holding miniature figures supposedly playing cards. The sign read "We need a new deck—not a new deal."

Among other hats entered in the contest was one worn by Mrs. John H. Neilson which was topped with a stuffed toy elephant. Mrs. Everett Faber, Central Point, wore an inverted mixing bowl decorated with brown satin ribbon which took a second glance to realize that it wasn't "for real" and Mrs. M. P. Vogel of Shady Cove, chairman of the event, had added a big political sign to her little straw hat.

Dresses and accessories for the style show had been loaned by members of the group and their friends. Mrs. Raymond B. Larson and Mrs. L. E. Edmunds furnished background music, singing songs from the Nineties, and Mrs. Otto Frohnmayer accompanied.

As each model appeared, she stood within a large gold-painted frame fashioned especially for the show. The show opened with Miss Ann Denman modeling a dress 138 years old and belonging to Mrs. Glen Smith. The blue alpaca was first worn by Mary Emmerson Smith - Thomas of Louisville, Ky., second cousin of John Greenleaf Whittier and great-grandmother of Mrs. Smith.

Miss Cynthia Toomey wore a gown which belonged to Mrs. Lewis Ulrich's mother and Miss Sue Drummond modeled a black lace dress, which belonged to the mother of Henry Pringle, and a dolman cape which belonged to Mrs. Pete Williams, great-grandmother of Mrs. C. C. Hoover.

Miss Janet Jamison also modeled a gown which had originally belonged to Mrs. Ulrich's mother, and carried gloves and bag loaned by Mrs. Claude E. McIntyre.

To the tune of "She's Only A Bird In A Gilded Cage," Mrs. Paul Antony modeled a black skirt first worn by the mother of Mrs. Milton Schuchard, and blouse from the wardrobe of Henry Pringle's mother. She carried a beaded bag which belonged to Mrs. McIntyre's mother.

Mrs. Lew Graves wore a family heirloom white summer dress with high topped shoes and carried a white parasol loaned by Mrs. John Solis, while Miss Virginia Gibbons appeared as "Miss America of 1890" wearing a bathing suit of that period which

is the property of Mrs. Charles Reames.

A white embroidered camisole and petticoat belonging to Effie Halley and loaned by Mrs. Solis were modeled by Miss Suzanne Singleton, and she also wore pantilettes from Mrs. Belle Jones' collection of heirloom clothes. Mrs. L. L. Sanders appeared in a brown traveling dress which belonged to Mrs. Curtis Hopkins' mother, and Mrs. Rover Fields modeled an 1890 gray silk dress, which had belonged to Mrs. Effie Halley, and a velvet cape which is the property of Mrs. Charles W. Lemery.

They sang "Jeannie with the Light Brown Hair," while Miss Sherry Antony modeled a blue velvet gown which belonged to Mrs. D. W. Luke, and was made by Lord & Taylor to be worn at the inaugural ball of Benjamin Harrison, 23rd president. She wore high shoes first worn by Mrs. Frank Humphrey's mother.
