Kahut Takes Coast Title At Portland

Portland, Ore., June 27—(U.P.)—Joe Kahut, 181, Woodburn, mythical northwest heavyweight champion, captured the Pacific coast heavyweight crown in a 12-round bout with Grant Butcher, 180, San Francisco, here last night.

The judges awarded the fight to Kahut unanimously.

The fighters appeared evenly matched in the first round and Butcher got the edge in the second, but from then on it was Kahut's fight, although he was unable to deliver a knockout blow.

Butcher previously beat Kahut who captured the northwest title from Bill Petersen in Seattle.

Butcher was knocked down twice in the sixth round last night and almost didn't get up the second time. Early in the fight, Kahut's timing appeared to be off and Butcher showed a sharp infighting technique.

But Kahut opened a cut over his opponent's left eye and from then on seemed able to hit him whenever he wanted to. Late in the bout, Kahut had to repeatedly throw Butcher off. In the ninth round he drew blood from the Californian's nose.
