State VFW Elects Portlander Head As Annual Sessions End at Salem

Salem, Ore., July 1—(U.P.)—L. R. Henderson, Portland, was elected department commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at concluding sessions of the state VFW convention here today.

Henderson succeeds Vere A. McCarty of Condon.

W. J. Ashworth, Portland, was named senior vice commander; Joe H. Hopkins, Salem, junior vice commander, succeeding Leon N. Glascock, Eugene.

Delegates approved a resolution calling on congress to establish a system of military training embodying six months' basic training supplemented by enlistments in reserve units.

Gen. MacArthur Given Toughest Job But Top Brass Agrees He Can Do It

Washington, July 1—(U.P.)—Top officers here agreed today that Gen. Douglas MacArthur has been given the toughest sort of military job, but they expressed confidence that he will save South Korea.

In addition to having taken over the losing side in the fighting, MacArthur was confronted with an extremely difficult supply problem and bad weather.

Shove Invaders Back

The immediate task facing the colorful 70-year-old general is to stop the tank-spearheaded advance of the North Korean communists. He must then shove the invaders back north of the 38th parallel which marks the border between North and South Korea.

Informed military sources would not speculate on how long

it might take MacArthur to clear the communist invaders out of South Korea but they indicated belief it would take at the least a matter of "weeks."

Much appeared to depend on what kind of fighting force can be salvaged out of a disorganized South Korean republican army that has lost, or thrown away, much of its equipment in retreat.

U. S. Must Do It

It now appears probable that American soldiers will have to do most of the job.

Top civilian and military officials here hoped at first that the status quo could be restored in Korea without using U. S. ground combat troops. However, MacArthur reported after his visit to the battlefield that U. S. air and naval support would not be enough.

With the prompt granting of his request for authority to use ground troops indications were that MacArthur now will conduct the campaign as he sees fit and without consulting Washington before committing available U. S. forces.

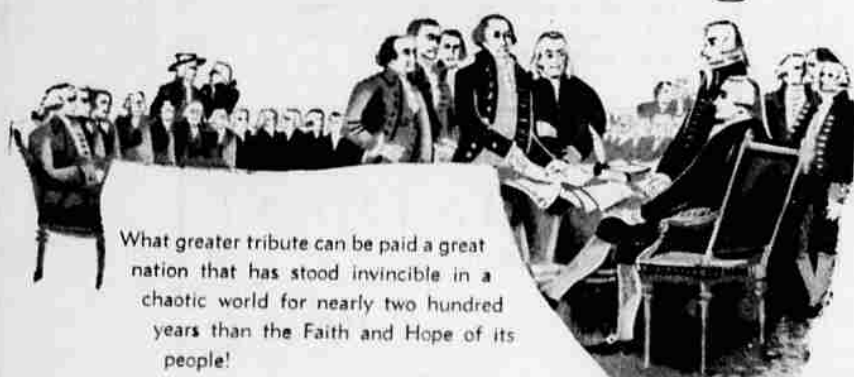
