

BPWC Federation Supports President In Korean Crisis

San Francisco, July 1—(U.P.)—The national board of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., meeting on the eve of the group's national convention here unanimously resolved today its support of President Truman and the United Nations in the Korean crisis.

Presidents of the federation from Hawaii and all 48 states, plus officers of the group's executive board, passed the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, when there is war any place in the world, there is always danger of world conflagration;

"AND WHEREAS, through the security council of the United Nations machinery is provided for checking the aggressor;

"Be it resolved that the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., applauds the action of President Truman in working through the UN to send materials and men to Korea to check the North Korean aggressors and pledges its best efforts to back up this action in the United States, that international law and justice may prevail and the UN be strengthened."

Between 5,000 and 6,000 women are expected to be present in the War Memorial opera house Sunday night when the group's 10th biennial convention opens. Gov. Earl Warren of California will welcome the delegates.

The convention lasts until July 7.
