

First Housing Units Started At White City Development

A self-sustaining city someday may flourish on the Camp White plain of Jackson county where soldiers trained for World War II.

Confident of the future of the White City Lumber company development at the former army camp site, Bruce Bauer, Inc., has outlined a long range plan for establishment of residential and business districts. It is a ten-year program, part of which is already underway.

Construction Started

Construction of 25 two-bedroom homes has been started by the Bauer firm, according to T. J. Hight, Medford realtor, who is handling the sales under federal housing administration terms. Depending on the sales of these, he said, another group of 28 multiple dwellings or three-bedroom homes will be constructed. In a third group 24 homes are contemplated.

The home sites are plotted on a huge, half-oval-shaped area and the dwellings, when the entire project is completed will front on three wide streets. In the center of the residential section will be a large recreation area. This area, where the head-

quarters of the 91st infantry division once stood, is about 800 feet southeast of the veterans domiciliary center.

Business Section

Across a wide division street from the residences and set far back from the thoroughfare, Bruce Bauer, Inc., plans a business section with off-the-street parking. This shopping center would be designed to attract highway trade as well as local shoppers. Offices and stores for a variety of businesses are anticipated in the overall development. A church, a school and an athletic field are included in the master plan.

Facilities would be leased to businessmen. Hight said the homes will be erected on spacious lots, the smallest to be 75 by 100 feet. The dwellings will have hardwood floors and will be well-insulated, he reported. Windows will be weather tight. All utilities, sewer, water, heating facilities, will be provided. Paved streets are included.

Fire Protection

Buyers will be protected fully by restricted covenants, Hight stated. He said that fire protec-

tion for the area has been worked out with White City Lumber company and the veterans administration domiciliary center.

The \$7,000 two-bedroom houses will sell for a \$400 down-payment which includes closing costs. Monthly payments will be \$37 plus a small sum for taxes. The tax amount to be included has not yet been determined, Hight said.

Completion of the first group of houses is expected in August. Hight reported that a number of prospective buyers have already indicated interest. The homes will provide near-the-job residence for employees of the veterans center and various industries of the area.

Medford Cadet Earns Distinguished Rating

Grange Convention

Let's we forget, it is well to think over how many people we know in the service of federal and state governments who are farmers past or present or the sons of farmers.

The political extremists among these farm folks in government service are few and far between. In this sense they are mainly mid-road Americans. To put it another way, they are good Grangers, in spirit if not in actual membership. They were to be met with all around the big Grange state convention at which I recently spoke a piece.

One who is both a government man and a Granger met me and took me in hand as soon as I showed up at the auditorium where the 3,000 delegates and attending members were gathered for the week of meetings. He was another Jim, and a son of John, as I am.

John is one of the very best practitioners of farm forestry that I know. Jim is an able and whole-souled servant of the people in the soil conservation service. If there are only a few like Jim Granger in the state department, we have little to fear from any more Hisses there. The great trouble in the state goes to the farm people for so few of its employees, in comparison with agriculture.

A Fair Trade

We could do worse than swap the main body of USDA personnel for that of USSD in the way of drastic reformation. Of course government farm services would suffer seriously for a time, but think of the value of the immediate vast improvement in our foreign relations that would ensue. And the state department boys would all unquestionably be improved by a period of life in the farming centers.

I should be in congress with my bright ideas. But this one I really like.

The Grange is just the organization to put this proposition over and make it work. The Grange has to do not only with farm economics and political issues but with the spirit of the land and its crops.

As a lodge the Grange reaches back into the most ancient times of soil cultivation and harvests, seeking to bring alive a communion of husbandry through the ages and in all lands and climes. In a practical sense, the Grange keeps its members fully informed on the workings of its government, particularly in the U. S. department of agriculture.

Should the fair trade I suggest be made, we could depend on the patriotic and knowing

Grangers to tutor the transferees from the state department in the work of the county agent, the soil conservation district conservator, the district forest ranger and all others above and below these ratings. Let's do try it.

Convention Speaking

My chores at the convention were to recite some Paul Bunyan fables at a salmon bake and to make a sober-sided talk between degrees at an evening session. The last needed to be worked up carefully in writing and then read with due care for facts and figures in delivery. The like is always a mean job and it always ends with a wonder as to its worth, either to audience or speaker.

There must be something to it, however, for convention organizers continue to invite speakers and speakers continue to accept and to expend much time and labor on preparation.

What I set forth to demonstrate was that the nation-wide advertising and promotion of the West Coast Lumbermen's association and other forest industry groups does hold and develop lumber trade in highly competitive markets and that this development serves farm and other small owners of commercial timber just as it does the large industrial owners. The fact is inescapable. Best of all for a speaker, it makes a whale of a good story.

Grangers John and Jim said I did all right on it, and I came home all pleased up. It was a day and evening of inspiring associations. Let me tell you, if you feel your faith in the United States of America slipping any, just hunt up a bunch of Grangers and horn into their company for a spell. Will it give you a lift? Boy!
