New York, July 5—(U.P.)—Stocks made a quiet recovery today.

All sections rose with the top-ranking industrials which firmed steadily after an irregularly lower opening.

Sales dwindled as traders took to the sidelines to await more definite indications of trend. Sales in the fourth hour amounted to only 180,000 shares, a rate of less than a million shares for a full session. Sales to 2 p.m. were the lightest for the period since June 19.

Dow Jones closing stock averages: 30 industrials 210.03 up 1.68; 20 railroads 52.40 up 0.74; 15 utilities 40.87 up 0.17; 65 stocks 73.57 up 0.64.

No Duty Call for New Navy Unit

There is no indication that the new naval reserve organized electronic company will be called to active duty because of the Korean crisis, according to Lt. Edward O. Leonard, commanding officer. He has returned from a week-end meeting at Seattle where he conferred with 13th naval district officers concerning progress in activating the unit here following two months of preparation.

"Primary purpose of our unit is to train men as radiomen, radarmen, sonarmen, and electronic technicians," Lieutenant Leonard explained. "The far east activity has not changed our objective here and we are looking forward to setting up the formal training program later this month."

He said that although the minimum complement of the company has been filled, there are still openings for seamen recruits. While the Medford unit is nearer actual activation than any of the other 12 similar groups in the Pacific northwest, the North Bend company is pressing for the honor.

Attendance of all hands is urgently requested at the regular meeting next Monday night in the Federal building, Lieutenant Leonard said. A team from Seattle will give physical examinations to all members of the unit and affidavits must be signed.
