

Pelicans Top Tornado 54-42 To Get Loop Lead Deadlock; Ralph Carroll Racks Up 32

Klamath Falls pulled even with Medford Friday night in the Southern Oregon conference Big Four basketball race and the Pelicans' giant Ralph Carroll was largely responsible.

Klamath dominated the Black Tornado here 54 to 42 for its seventh win against two losses and for a first-place deadlock Medford has the same record in league contention.

Medford fought hard and hustled all the way but Carroll's six-foot seven inches and the height of his teammates, Ray Bell, six-five, and Jack Horton, six-four, proved a bit too much altitude for the scrapping Tornado.

Many Rebounds Carroll was responsible for the bulk of Pelican scoring with 32 points on 14 field goals and four free shots. Twenty-one of his counters came in the first half. The skyscraping center pulled down 17 rebounds in addition to plunking in frequent tip-in shots.

Klamath made the most of its height keeping the pace generally slow and deliberate to set up its taller men, principally Carroll, for shots close in. The pace picked up a bit in the second quarter but cooled down again in the next period.

The Pelicans were on top all the way. Medford kept close to the Pel's heels in the early moments. Klamath sprinted from an 11 to 10 edge midway in the first quarter to a 20 to 11 spread. The Tornado cut the margin to 20 to 17 by the end of the stanza.

Gain Good Lead In the second quarter Klamath worked to a 32 to 21 margin and led by 34 to 17 at halftime. The Pel's held never less than a seven point advantage in the third quarter and the spread was generally nine or 10 points. Third period intermission standing was 45 to 36.

Medford threatened the Pelicans in the fourth period with field goals by Derald Wootton and Ed Bingham, while Cal Gilmore of Klamath was getting a free heave, slicing the gap to 46 to 40.

Carroll's tip-in made it 48 to 40. Then Dick Atterbury scored

the Tornado's last field shot for a 48 to 42 standing. Klamath went into a stall at that point. The Medfordites put up a great battle and might have made a tighter contest had they had better luck at hitting the hoop. They dropped in only 24 per cent of their attempts from the field.

Conner's Goals Thrill Dennis Conner headed Medford in point-making with 15 of which 12 were in the first half. He thrilled spectators with long heaves for tallies at the buzzer blasts ending the first quarter and the half. Don Spinas almost duplicated the feat at the end of the third period. His cast bounded off the hoop.

Klamath Falls dominated the backboards in the first half with 20 rebounds to nine by Medford. But the Tornado fighting spirit-

edly out-rebounded Klamath 18 to 12 in the second half. With either Wootton and Jack Boardman or Wootton and Bingham teaming up against him, the Pel's Carroll was held down better in the second half.

Griffin Creek and Oak Grove teamed to defeat Lone Pine and Howard 36 to 20 in a West-East grade school preliminary. Griffin Creek tallied 14 and Oak Grove 22 for the West and Lone Pine and Howard each 10 for the East.

The biggest crowd of the season jammed the Medford gym Friday.

Eagle Point Spills Crater 40-36 in Overtime Fracas

Eagle Point's hoop quintet, employing specially devised tactics, spilled Crater high 40 to 36 here Friday night in an overtime JDJ league battle at Central Point.

The Eagles shoved Crater out of possible JDJ co-championship. Myrtle Creek defeated Illinois Valley 71 to 45 at Cave Junction last night to cop the pennant.

Crater supporters felt the Comets, who missed many shots, were far off their game. But Coach Jerry Mosby felt his Eagle crew had a well-earned triumph with a strategy aimed at putting the pressure on the Comets and keeping them off balance.

Long Stall The initial bit of strategy employed by the Eagles and aimed at keeping Crater from getting a big jump was to stall the first seven minutes of the game. The teams went scoreless in that time. Crater, however, managed to

quarter and pulled to what appeared to be a commanding advantage, 24 to 13, at halftime.

In the second half, the Eagles, double-teaming against the man with the ball, held the Comets to three field goals. Third period count still favored Crater 28 to 20 and about one minute before the end of the regular playing time in the fourth frame Eagle Point caught up 36 to 36.

Overtime Scores Bud Lucas got a free bucket and field goal and Bob Kimmel a free toss in the overtime for Eagle Point.

The game ended the regular season for Crater with a 16-win five-loss record. Crater took the Little Three title with three wins and one loss and still has the District No. 4 play-offs on March 7 and 8.

Crater won the jayvee game Friday 43 to 35.
