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Plight of Underprivileged To Be Prayer Day Theme

A program dedicated to the needs and problems of underprivileged persons in America will be given when members of Medford Council of Church Women observe the annual World Day of Prayer Friday, February 29. Services here will be conducted in Church of the Nazarene at 2 p. m. under the general chairmanship of Mrs. Frank Heiler.

The underprivileged persons in whose plight the council women are particularly interested include sharecroppers, Indians and migratory workers. All of those are being aided by work of the United Council of Church Women, under the auspices of which the day of prayer is held each year.

Members will also inspect migratory workers' living accommodations in the Medford area the same day.

Women attending the observance will join in a responsive service. It is announced, and blind women will be able to participate for the first time through the use of specially prepared braille services. Roy McCorkle, representative for CARE in southeastern Europe for the past two years, will also take part in the service, reporting on the work of his organization in southern Europe.

In a recent statement giving his approval to the World Day of Prayer program, Gov. Douglas McKay said:

"America's annual observance of the 'World Day of Prayer'... will be acknowledged throughout the State of Oregon by appropriate activities designed to foster a deeper understanding and appreciation of the word and work of God. In 104 countries throughout the world and in 17,000 communities in our own land, prayer services will be held.

"In this disturbing period when man is groping for answers to problems of unprecedented complexity, we must increase our reliance on God for truthful guidance.

"Therefore, I commend to all Oregonians the high purpose of the World Day of Prayer, and urge their participation in this effort to reemphasize the values that stand as beacons lighting the road to peace."
