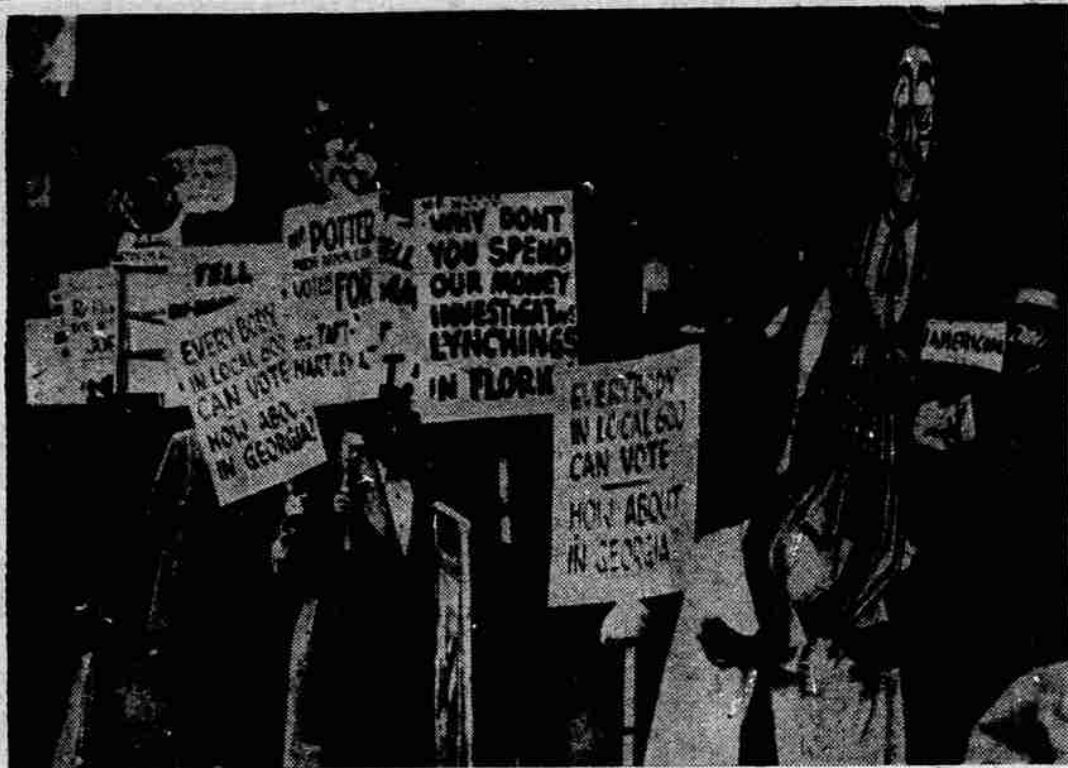

Prompt Action Urged On GI Bill Benefits
Former GI Bill veterans trainees who returned to active military have been reminded by the Veterans Administration that they have little time to lose if they want to resume their GI studies after discharge.

According to the VA, veterans must resume their training within a reasonable period after their release from active duty. That period, the VA said, will be based on the circumstances of each veteran's case, and will depend on the kind of training he is taking and a number of other factors.

Generally, the VA said, veterans will be expected to resume school training at the beginning of the next term following discharge. In other types of training, where courses are conducted on a continuous basis, veterans should enroll at their earliest opportunity.

The regulations apply to veterans affected by the July 25, 1951, cut-off date for entering training, who had previously been in training under the GI Bill, but who were unable to be enrolled at that time because of re-entrance into military service.

Camp White's own orchestra, a veteran's quartette of "Old Timers," a dramatic portrayal of the Rogue Valley Vampire, a medley of songs and fancy steps, music by the "Superfluous Syncopeated Symphony," skit about gold rush Klondike Days, and other items will be on the program.

"Chow call" will be sounded and the volunteers served refreshments by a group of veterans.

Instead, she said she was in love with someone over there and wanted to be free. I'm married to him now after I had gone with him for nearly three years. He said he loves me more than his first wife. That is why I married him. But, should I believe him? He keeps her pictures around and it hurts me very much. What do you think I can do about this?"

A. The best thing is to make no issue about the pictures your husband keeps of his first wife. And, the next best thing is to believe him when he says he loves you more than he loved her.

You may not realize it but your jealousy of his first wife will seriously influence your attitude toward him. How can you expect to be a loving wife under such conditions?

As for the pictures, let him keep them and look at them when he wishes. In time, he will probably put them away as memories of your marriage fill his mind and crowd out other memories.

You might hasten this putting away of his former wife's pictures by having a good pic-

ture of yourself taken and framed so attractively that it will take the place of honor among his possessions. Give his former wife a bit of competition this way.

The fact she asked for her freedom to marry someone else will mean no further competition from her. The chances are that he will never even see her again, with an ocean between them.

Can't Take Memories Away
If he were happy in his first marriage, it is logical that he would have happy memories of it. Those memories you cannot take away nor should you try. But, they are only memories and can not harm you.

As time goes on, his present marriage will occupy his thoughts so much that the past will become dimmer and dimmer until it is almost forgotten. Don't talk about the past, don't refer to his former wife

unless he does, and never ask him if he loves you as much as he loved her. Keep his thoughts concentrated on the present and the future, if you want the past to fade into the background. 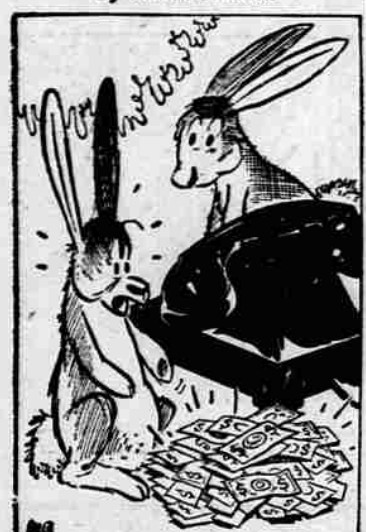
