Washington—(U.P.)—The lady pig now can lift her snoot and call herself a queen.



Science is behind her. She no longer has to worry about rolling over in the hog wallow to feed her family. You all will now please call the sow a lady!

The scientists have fixed it up so that the sow can go on rooting for whatever, and not have to fret about another thing except the next litter.

All of this was demonstrated at Prophetstown, Ill., in the heart of the hog country.

It was the first showing of synthetic sow's milk. Stuff that contains terramycin, the same thing doctors give humans for the virus that has been kicking around.

Increases Growth
The sow's milk is called "terrac" and is produced by a Brooklyn chemical firm. It has been used successfully to increase the growth and livability of young pigs.

The show was put on at the 360 acre farm of Mrs. Evelyn Weber.

Mrs. Weber got the idea of pepping up her pigs from her 17-year-old son, Rollin. He read about it in a scientific article on the synthetic milk.

She decided to try the stuff and sent off for some.

Mrs. Weber told me over the country telephone line that she plans to produce 95 to 100 litters of pigs this year. That, she added,

will mean between 700 and 800 good sized hogs this year for the market.

"In the past," Mrs. Weber said, "I have been unable to send more than 500 to market. Maybe now I'll start to make some money."

Mrs. Weber is enthusiastic about her pig venture.

"I'll make a go of it, too," she said. "And I won't lose any planting time, or cultivating time, or harvesting time. Somebody said this must be an awful lot of work. It isn't. Looking after 200 baby pigs at a time is no more trouble than 300 baby chicks. And there is more money in hogs than chickens. The only help I have is my son and one hired hand."

Scandal of Neighborhood
Mrs. Weber, who weighs all of 108 pounds, less than a junior hog, told me she was the "scandal of the neighborhood" when she started in the small pig business.

"I put out a sign which said, 'no visitors,'" she said. "I didn't want anybody coming in and giving my pigs a lot of germs. I put windows around the hog pens, in case anybody got in, so they couldn't get near the animals."

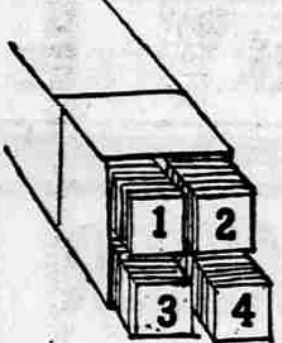

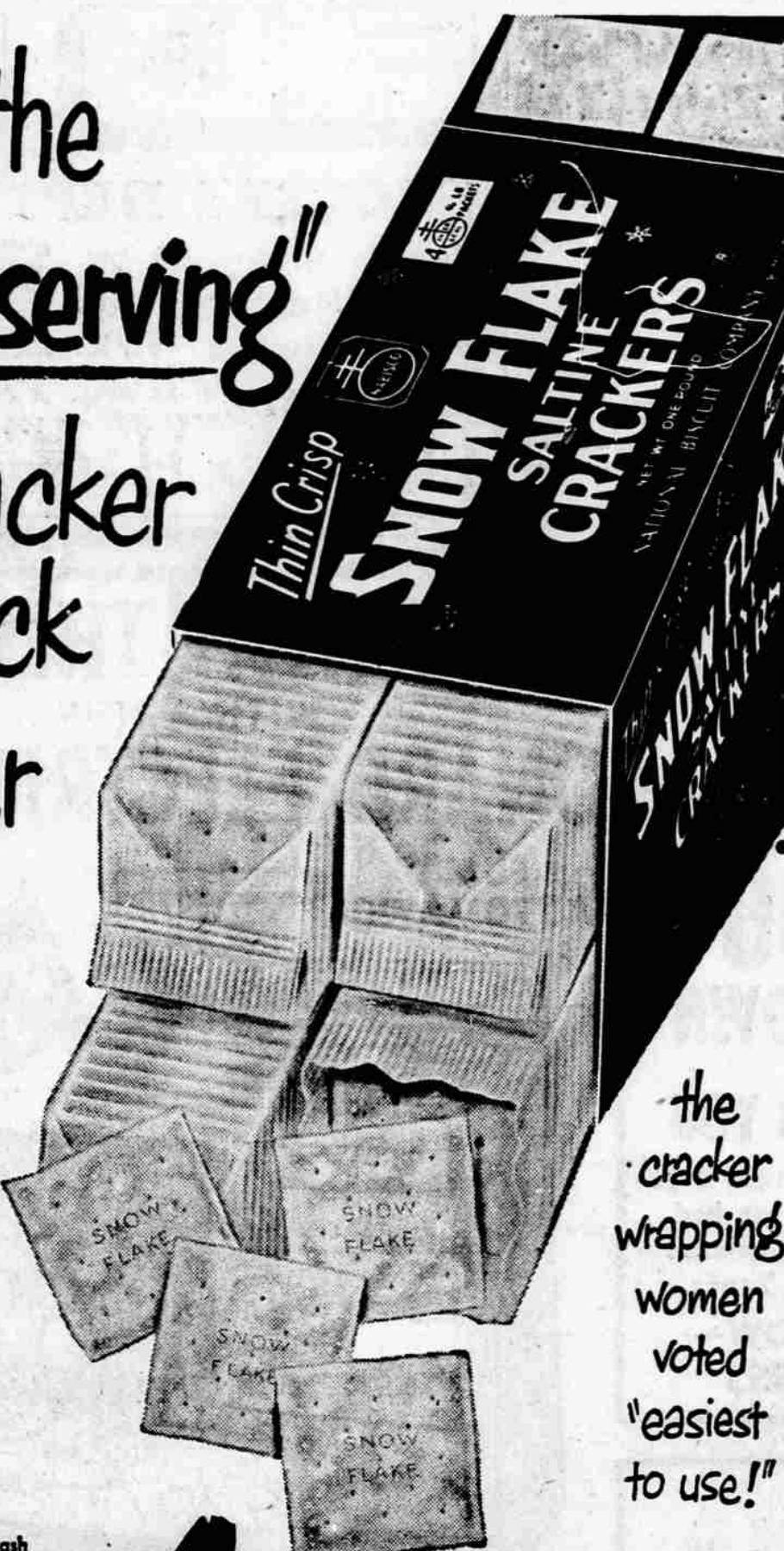
