Scouts of Shady Cove Honored by Two Groups

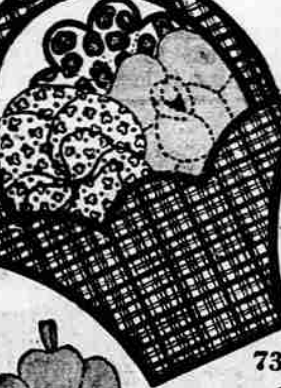

Duo-Piano Team Presents Program for Association

Jackson County Civic Music association presented a program by the duo-piano team, Ferrante and Teicher, February 26 at the senior high school auditorium.

The concert was a pleasing example of the development of interest in music not only locally but throughout the nation. Mr. Ferrante and Mr. Teicher have been educated and trained to play together the best in music throughout a wide field and gave an exciting program in a manner that was liked and understood. Many people are a bit skeptical as to piano playing being a medium of entertainment, but the early arrival by special truck of two seven-foot Steinway grand pianos together with two chauffeurs and a corps of workmen to set the stage convinced onlookers that the management believed that concerts are worthwhile and by 7:30 p. m. the auditorium was well-filled. It seemed by 8:30 o'clock the membership of our civic association had arrived, though there was still a quarter-hour to wait before curtain time.

So little music has been composed for duo-piano that the artists, from the marvellous wealth of piano literature, make many of their own arrangements from both the early and "modern classics."

The concert was ultra-modernistic in concept, design and presentation. The men play with the utmost unity, precision, rhythm and technical skill. They accept the modern idea that piano playing is not pounding, beating and hitting the piano but a studied means of eliciting beautiful tone from instruments for the purpose of expressing unlimited shades of meaning through music. To this end the opening prelude and the fugue by Bach seemed to gain in clarity of design by transferring the themes alternately to the two instruments. This was also true of the Saint-Saens "Variations on a Theme by Beethoven."

This basic idea prevailed also in treatment of the modernistic idiom of Khachaturian, Debussy and the American idiom, Gershwin.

The audience must have appreciated the unique and altogether fine concert as they demanded four encores and the concert was finished off with a tribute to American patriotism, "The Stars and Stripes Forever."

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OSBA Aids in Fight To Keep Air Service

La Grande, Ore. (U.P.)—The Oregon State Board of Aeronautics is supporting eastern Oregon communities in their fight to keep airline service to that part of the state, Board Member William M. Peare reported Thursday.

The board, backing chambers of commerce and other civic groups' recommendations that La Grande, Pendleton, Baker and Ontario not be dropped from Empire Airlines routes, directed the attorney general's office to file its objections and prepare briefs for a March 6 hearing in Washington, D.C.
