

Bonneville Revenues At New High; Power Still Remains Short

Portland—(U.P.)—Bonneville Power Administration revenues for 1951 hit a new high of \$36,189,028 gained from sales of more than 15,000,000,000 kilowatt hours of power but Administrator Paul J. Raver said Thursday the Pacific Northwest still remains "woefully short" of generation.

In its annual report, BPA said the gain of about 16 per cent in revenues over 1950 generally was result of favorable water conditions, installation of last scheduled generator units at Grand Coulee dam and heavy defense power demands.

Aluminum and other industries, expanding after outbreak of the Korean war, accounted

for 47.8 per cent of total gross increased revenues, the report stated. Public utilities accounted for 27.5 per cent of the increase; private utilities, 23.5 and other sales, 1.2 per cent.

Net revenues were \$14,495,552, a gain of about 22 per cent over the previous year.

The report said that construction completed during the year, brought transmission facilities to 4,370 circuit miles of transmission lines and 123 substations serving parts of four Northwest states. The additions brought relief to the serious power-deficit areas of Puget Sound, Longview-Vancouver-Portland and southwest Oregon load centers, the report stated. Still Short of Power

However, Raver said the region remained woefully short of generation.

He said that to make full use of Pacific Northwest hydroelectric potentialities, BPA has made specific recommendations to the Defense Electric Power Administration through which 200,000 kilowatts of federal capacity and 1,000,000 kilowatts of non-federal capacity might be installed within a 36 months period, and 780,000 additional kilowatts of federal capacity in a period of 60 months.

The administrator also advocated installations of 400,000 kilowatts of fuel-fired generation and tie lines to California and Idaho.

The report said that important power developments since close of the fiscal year, June 30, included approval of five-year contracts between all major Pacific Northwest private utilities and the BPA, establishment of a Northwest area office of the DEPA and experimental cloud seeding in the upper Columbia River basin.

Salem—(U.P.)—Homer D. Angell of Portland filed his candidacy with the state election bureau Wednesday for re-election as congressman from the third Oregon congressional district. He will seek the Republican nomination.

Ed. G. Boehnke of Eugene filed for delegate to the Republican national convention from the fourth congressional district, but did not name a choice for president.

King aspirants are Herb Wing and Lynn Smith, Medford; Darel Verley, Tulelake; Max Larson, Lakeview; and Ken Humphreys, Eastside.

ELECTED REPRESENTATIVE

Ashland—Donn D. DeBernardi, Roseburg, was elected representative-at-large to the Southern Oregon college student council yesterday at a special election to fill a vacancy in the body. He defeated Monte Kounz, Medford, and Robert J. Hilliard, Seattle, in a tight race. Students also approved a constitutional amendment to revise athletic awards.

New Water District Northwest of City Asked in Petitions

Petitions asking for a special election on formation of a water district are being circulated in an area bordering the northwest city limits of Medford, it was reported today.

The petitions are directed to the Jackson county court, which is the only body empowered to call such elections. The petitions must carry the signatures of 15 per cent of the registered voters before the court will take action. A simple majority is required to approve or reject the formation of the district.

The area involved in the proposed district includes Maple Park drive, Ross lane, West McAndrews road, Sweet road, Pinecroft avenue, Sunset avenue and surrounding areas.

If the special election is called and formation of the district approved by the voters, the district will then take steps to obtain articles of incorporation from the state similar to those used to incorporate a city.

As representatives of an incorporated water district, the board of directors would then be able to negotiate with the city of Medford for a contract to furnish water to the area. Under similar agreements which have been worked out with other incorporated districts in the past, water would be sold to the district through a master meter and resold to patrons by the district.

Persons circulating the petitions state that the district would be bonded and bonds would be paid for from revenue from water and from taxes.

Influenza Cases Up To 87 at Week's End

The number of reported influenza cases in the county had reached 87 by the end of last week, according to the weekly report from the county health department.

The department has said that some of the flu cases, or "flu-like infections", have been mild and many patients have not called their doctors. The report showed 65 cases in Medford, 11 in Phoenix, 7 in Talent and 4 in Rogue River.

There were only five other disease cases reported in the county. There were two cases of infectious mononucleosis in Medford and a case each of mumps in Central Point, measles in Rogue River, and chicken pox in Ashland.

Ellsworth Believes Truman Will Run

Portland—(U.P.)—The question of whether President Truman will run for reelection is the number one topic of conversation in Washington, D.C., Rep. Harris Ellsworth said Thursday. The Oregon Republican said he thought the president would run. "The party leaders know Truman is their best bet... and they want him to run..." he said.

Ellsworth flew here from the nation's capitol Wednesday. He will speak at a dinner meeting of University of Oregon alumni here Saturday.

New Secret Allied Code Allows Free Communication

Naples, Italy—(U.P.)—A newly developed secret Allied code, designed to permit free communication among the United States, British, French and Italian fleets, was tested Wednesday in giant

sea-air maneuvers in the Mediterranean.

The code, worked out to eliminate language differences in communications among the big fleets of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, was tested under simulated battle conditions.

Adm. Robert B. Carney, American commander of the NATO forces in southern Europe, said at a news conference that the code was used by hundreds of American, British, French and Italian warships engaged in the maneuvers—called "Operation Grand Slam", the biggest ever held in the Mediterranean in peace time.

The new code can be broken down in minimum time in to English, French or Italian, Carney said.

Recipe for SPAGHETTI 'n' ANCHOVY SAUCE:

1 large onion, chopped	1 cup chicken consommé
2 lbs. chopped parsley	Pepper
