

War II Army Vehicles Kept in Condition by Storage in Big Tanks

Lima, O.—(U.P.)—For the first time the Army has uncorked its "tin can tank farms"—the Ordnance Department's version of the Navy's "mothball fleet."

Col. Stanley W. Connelly, commanding officer of the Lima ordnance depot, revealed Thursday that the Army literally has "canned" hundreds of World War II vehicles at storage depots across the country.

Look Like Oil Tanks

Two miles west of this small Ohio city is the biggest of the "tin can tank farms," studded with storage drums that look for all the world like huge oil tanks.

But inside the concrete-floored, steel-sided drums are parked the tanks, armored cars, weapons carriers and other vehicles that survived World War II to fight again. The "tin cans" are 11 feet high and from 38 to 55 feet in diameter. About half a dozen combat vehicles are parked inside each one.

Sealed Against Weather

The tin cans are sealed against the weather by a special plastic. Humidifying devices keep dry air circulating through the huge drums.

Connelly said this kind of stor-

age keeps the vehicles in such good condition that depot workers can often get them running under their own power within two or three hours after they are taken out of mothballs.

He said that within 60 hours most of them are ready for delivery to Korea or Western Europe.

Other tin can tank farms are located at Lacarne, O.; Anniston, Ala.; Chambersburg, Pa.; Tacoma, Wash.; Texarkana, Tex.; Herlong, Calif.; Tooele, Utah; and Aberdeen, Md.

Olympia—(U.P.)—The Ambassador Doukhorbor choir from British Columbia Friday continued on its good-will tour of Washington and Oregon after missing a chance to sing hymns in the Washington state capitol rotunda, famous for its acoustics.

The 27 young men and women were unable to sing in the capitol building because they had not made the necessary advance arrangements with the state department of public institutions. Their tour is being sponsored by the American Friends service committee of Newberg, Ore. The Doukhorbors speak English but sing their hymns in Russian.
