

Society Selects Picture of Month

Announcement of the March "picture of the month," selected from paintings done by Southern Oregon Society of Artists members, was made last week by the society. The painting is a rural landscape entitled "Horse Barn," and was painted by Daniel Tesch, 2308 Highland avenue, Grants Pass. The picture will be placed in a show window of Barker's store where the selections are shown each month.

The artist, a German, escaped from East Germany about three years ago and now lives with his daughter. He is unable to speak English as yet and is deaf, having lost his hearing during the first world war.

First apprenticed to an artist in Berlin, Mr. Tesch has been a painter all his life. After loss of his hearing he sold his pictures

to a dealer who exhibited and sold them all over Europe, including England, according to members of the society. During World War II he lost two of his sons.

In addition to the March selection done by Mr. Tesch, another of his paintings, an Oregon woodland scene in fall colors is now on exhibit at the Olson Furniture store as a part of the southern Oregon artists' continuing exhibit there.

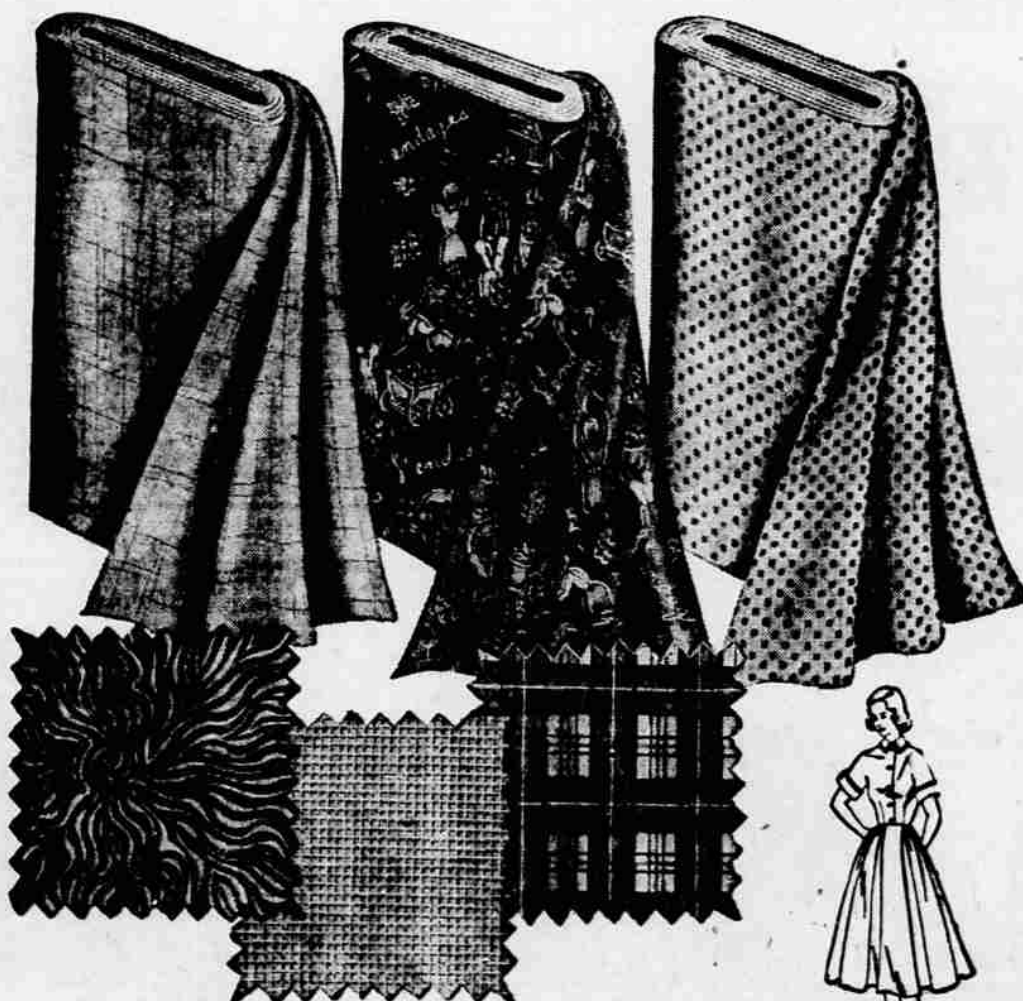

An unhappy woman came into our office last week. The unhappy creature was Mrs. Lester Gilman, who can't understand why valley women don't enroll in home nursing courses which the Red Cross sponsors. The home nursing course is conceded by most who have taken it to be practical and useful, but in recent months it has been almost impossible to enroll a good-sized class.

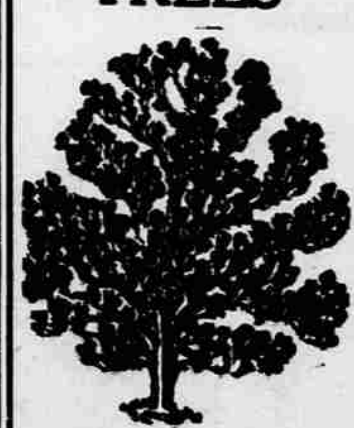
Mrs. Gilman, who is chairman of home nursing, tells women that the American Red Cross says home nursing should be a "must" for at least one person in every family, and that national civilian defense officials urge all women, and men too, to enroll if they aren't already trained, but still they don't enroll.

"I simply can't understand it," said Mrs. Gilman earnestly. "I'm told that in other communities there is no trouble in keeping good-sized classes going most of the time. There must be something wrong with our approach to the problem."

Would anyone like to offer Mrs. Gilman some suggestions on how to increase interest in home nursing classes?

While she wasn't quite as perturbed as Mrs. Gilman, another Red Cross worker did express concern last week. Mrs. J. P. Naumes, who has been a Red Cross volunteer for almost 11 years, wondered why younger women don't show more interest.
